Santa Anita Purse Biggest on Record
Arcadia, Calif., Sept. 19—(U.P.)—Santa Anita's derby purse will be doubled from \$50,000 to \$100,000, making it the richest derby event exclusively for three-year-olds in turf records, track officials said today.

Santa Anita Park, in announcing its 1945-46 stakes program for the 55-day winter meeting from Dec. 29 to March 16, listed \$650,000 for distribution, biggest purse total in racing history.

The Santa Anita handicap purse also reached the \$100,000 mark.

ILLINOIS JOCKEY STRIKE APPEARS TO BE SETTLED

Chicago, Sept. 19—(U.P.)—The threatened jockey strike at two Illinois tracks today appeared to have died an early death.

Riders at the Hawthorne track, Chicago, and the Fairmount track at Collinsville, near St. Louis, Mo., originally were scheduled to walk out today but the Jockey Guild of America postponed the strike yesterday pending the verdict of the guild's board of directors in New York.

The strike originally had been called by the guild to protest refusal of the Illinois racing board to grant a license to Wendell Eads. He was suspended almost a year and a half ago because of a series of violations he allegedly committed during three years of riding on the nation's leading tracks.

In announcing postponement of the strike, John B. Kelly, general manager of the guild, said the jockeys at both tracks would be permitted to accept mounts through Monday at which time he expected to be informed of the directors' verdict. Kelly added that if the guild directors approved the strike, it might spread nationwide.

An official high in racing circles, however, said that the strike would never materialize and that Eads undoubtedly would take his case to court just as Jockey Robert Merritt did in New York two years ago.

TENNIS TOURNEY IN THIRD ROUND

Los Angeles, Sept. 19—(U.P.)—Argentine Champion Herald Weiss Ecuadorian Net Ace Francisco (Pancho) Segura and the U. S. national champion, Sgt. Frankie Parker, went into third-round play in the Pacific southwest tennis tournament today, headed for a three-way clash near the top.

Weiss eliminated Hugh Stewart of San Marino, Cal., 6-2, 6-3 in second-round play, while Segura scored a 6-3, 6-1 win over Bill Maxwell and Parker downed Bill Robertson 6-1, 6-2.

In other matches, Alejo Russell of Argentine set down Henry Carbajal, 6-0, 6-0 and Francis X. Shields defeated John Sisson 9-7, 6-0, 6-4.

Penicillin Mixed With Ice Cream For Sore Throat

San Diego, Sept. 19—(U.P.)—Penicillin is now being mixed with ice cream and used in the treatment of throat and mouth diseases at the U. S. naval training center here, it was revealed today.

Doctors at the center said they have successfully used the ice cream-penicillin compound in the treatment of streptococcus throat infection, trench mouth, scarlet fever and acute tonsillitis. They said even the most severe strep throat was completely cured in 10 doses.

In making the mixture, the ice cream is allowed to melt. Then penicillin is added in amounts ranging from 2,000 to 25,000 units, and the ice cream is re-frozen.

In addition to being pleasant to take, doctors said the low temperature assures that the penicillin will be at full strength when it reaches the infected areas.

HIGH SCHOOL BOYS GIVEN EXEMPTION FROM INDUCTION

Washington, Sept. 19—(U.P.)—Selective Service today gave American high school boys the choice of going to school or getting a rifle—and if it's school they can't play hockey.

It announced that boys who entered high school before they were 18 years of age will be given a chance to graduate before becoming eligible for induction.

If their choice is school, Selective Service said, the boys will have to attend "continuously and satisfactorily."

The new regulation applies to all students until they reach the age of 20. If a student fails to graduate by the time he is 20 he automatically becomes liable to induction.

The United States Department of Education reported that there are 317,000 boys aged 18 and 19 now attending high school throughout the country. Of these 214,000 are 18 years old and 76,000 are 19.

The average graduation age is around 17½.
