Alcoholism

Toil and Tears Lot of Japs in British Domain

Hong Kong, Sept. 24.—(U.P.)—Rear Adm. Cecil Harcourt, Britain's military governor of Hong Kong, assured the captured Japanese garrison today that they would get a full dose of toil, sweat and tears until they have cleaned up the mess they made of this once-flourishing British colony.

"We're treating them within the rules, but their life is hard," Harcourt said. "Frankly, I would not want to be a Jap prisoner."
