

THREE DOOLITTLE FLIERS EXECUTED, DOCUMENTS SHOW

Captured Japanese Records Disclose Fate of Men On Initial Tokyo Attack.

Shanghai, Sept. 27—(U.P.)—Captured enemy records provided the first definite confirmation today that the Japanese executed three American airmen who participated in the famed "Doolittle raid" on Tokyo April 18, 1942.

The records, including the official Japanese account of the perfunctory court martial which condemned the men, disclosed that they died before a firing squad at a war prisoners' camp near Shanghai's Kiangwan race track, Oct. 15, 1942.

Men Identified
The fliers were identified as: 1st Lt. William G. Farrow of Washington and Darlington, S. C.; 1st Lt. Dean Hallmark of Dallas, Tex.

Sgt. Harold A. Spatz of Lobo, Kan., and New York state.

A fourth member of the Doolittle team, 1st Lt. Robert J. Meder of Lakewood, O., died in a Nanking prison Dec. 1, 1943, of malnutrition, beri beri and dysentery. The remaining four of the eight Doolittle fliers captured by the Japanese were liberated last month and three already have been flown back to the United States.

The court martial records revealed that all eight fliers originally were sentenced to death, though the sentences of all but three subsequently were commuted to life imprisonment.

Got Mock Trial
The records bear the signatures and official chops of the four chief Japanese officers who participated in what was little more than a mock trial. They have been placed on top of the American war crimes list in the Shanghai area for submission to the Chinese for action.

The wanted officers are: Lt. Col. Makajo Toyama, presiding judge; 1st Lt. Wamitsu Yusei, associate judge; 2nd Lt. Okada Ryukel, associate judge, and Maj. Hata Itsuro, trial prosecutor.

The court record gave the lie to Japanese claims that they did not impose special punishment on air crews. It specifically stated that the eight airmen were being tried "under that portion of the military regulations which comes under enemy plane crews."

Trial in Japanese
The proceedings lasted only a half-hour and consisted merely of a recital of the provisions of the military regulations under which the fliers were arraigned. The trial was conducted entirely in Japanese.

Japanese propaganda broadcasts in late 1942 and 1943 referred vaguely to the execution of "several" of the Doolittle airmen, but never gave any dates or names.

However, the U. S. State department protested to Tokyo on the basis of the broadcasts and the late President Roosevelt denounced the executions as outright murder.

Newspapers Given Praise by Dewey
On War Conduct

Albany, N. Y., Sept. 27—(U.P.)—Gov. Thomas E. Dewey said today that the conduct of American newspapers during the war "was nothing short of magnificent."

In a statement to the New York State Publishers Association and the New York Press association in observance of newspaper week, Oct. 1-8, Dewey said that never before had there been such "complete, vivid and enterprising coverage" of complex and moving events.

"What also arouses deep admiration," he said, "is the manner in which our newspapers voluntarily and spontaneously complied with the censorship code and were patriotically faithful to the need of vigilance in keeping from the enemy any information that might have helped him."

MEAT TYPES TO BE RATION-FREE

Washington, Sept. 27—(U.P.)—Hamburger, sausage and luncheon meats are among the meats that will become ration-free Oct. 1, it was disclosed today.

The agriculture department said that red point values on these types of meat will be reduced to zero at the beginning of the new ration period.

At the same time, about 15 per cent of the whole meat supply will be made ration-free by reducing to zero the points required for the three lower grades of beef—canner, cutter and utility.

There has been speculation that lower grades of lamb and veal also will be made a point free.

Distillers Receive Limited Corn Stock

Washington, Sept. 27—(U.P.)—The agriculture department today allocated distillers 750,000 bushels of corn—enough for one and a half days' operation—for manufacturing beverage alcohol in October.

The corn allotment will be in addition to the 3,000,000 bushels of wheat and other grains authorized for the month.

The action means that a trickle of bourbon whiskey eventually will be available for civilians from the October output.

Use of corn for whiskey making has been banned because of the shortage of the grain for livestock feed.

Enlistment Bill Passed by Senate

Washington, Sept. 27—(U.P.)—The senate today passed the voluntary enlistment bill after rejecting a proposal to raise military pay \$25 a month as an extra inducement.

The vote on the pay-raise proposal, offered by Sen. Wayne L. Morse, R., Ore., was 64 to 13.

Passage of the bill came on voice vote after another Morse amendment, extending the family allowance for enlistees, was approved.

DeGAULLE PLANE GIVEN UNDER WAR POWER ACT

Washington, Sept. 27—(U.P.)—The gift of a C-54 air transport to Gen. Charles DeGaulle of France was made under the war powers act, President Truman said today.

Mr. Truman told reporters that the presentation of the plane to DeGaulle was a gesture of good will and friendship by the United States government to the French nation.

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Pickpockets Held By L. A. Officers Trained in Mexico

Los Angeles, Sept. 27—(U.P.)—Police held 10 young pickpockets today who said they were trained by a nimble-fingered master in Mexico City and sent north to prey on the rich Americans.

Capt. Blaine Steed, whose bunco squad rounded up the gang, said the youths, all but one of them Mexicans, had lifted \$30,000 from the pockets of Los Angeles pedestrians in the last few weeks. "It was the largest such gang we've ever had here," Steed said.

The youths ranged from 15 to 27 years old. They said they were getting ready to move on to Fresno, Calif., and had bought

some snappy new automobiles for the trip.


