ENGLISH SHIPPING TO BYPASS PANAMA CANAL

San Francisco, Sept. 27—(U.P.)—Great Britain has ordered all her shipping to and from Australia and New Zealand to "cease using the Panama Canal" because of high tolls, Melbourne radio said today.

In a broadcast picked up by the American Broadcasting Co., Melbourne said the British ministry of war transport had instructed ships on the Australia-New Zealand run to use routes around Cape Horn, the Cape of Good Hope and through the Suez Canal instead.

MORE RED POINTS FOR WASTE FATS

Washington, Sept. 27—(U.P.)—The nation's housewives will receive four red points a pound instead of two for their waste kitchen fats starting Oct. 1 under a government program to offset a serious shortage of industrial fats. The price of waste fat will remain at four cents a pound.

Secretary of Agriculture Clinton P. Anderson said that every pound of waste fats was needed to "speed up the return of plentiful supplies of soap to the grocer's shelves."

ALUMINUM COMPETITION IS PUT UP TO CONGRESS

Washington, Sept. 27—(U.P.)—Congress was faced today with a demand by the surplus property board to assure "effective competition" in the aluminum industry by disposing of the government's \$739,000,000 aluminum holdings to competitors of the Aluminum Company of America.

The board said sale of the government's huge bauxite plant at Jones Mills, Ark., and its 52 major aluminum plants to ALCOA's competitors would "fulfill one of the brightest opportunities for market expansion in the history of industrial materials."

Roosevelt Stock In Radio Concern Shows Value Hike

Hollywood, Sept. 27—(U.P.)—Daily Variety, in a copyrighted article, today quoted Elliott Roosevelt as saying the Texas radio stock he bought back from creditors for two cents on the dollar in 1941 is now worth more than \$1,500,000.

Variety quoted Roosevelt as saying part of the stock is now in possession of his former wife, Ruth Goggins of Dallas, Tex., and in trust for the children of their marriage.

Roosevelt, recently placed on the army air forces inactive roster, plans to return to radio in a capacity he cannot yet reveal, Variety said. The son of the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt could not be reached for confirmation.

Key War Plants To Be Dismantled As War Debt Payment

Frankfurt, Sept. 27—(U.P.)—The biggest ball bearing factory in Europe and four other key war plants in the American occupation zone of Germany will be dismantled for shipment as the initial payment of Germany's war debt.

Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower gave the order for dismantling of the plants yesterday. They also included a shipyard capable of building warships as large as cruisers, a huge power plant and aircraft engine factories.

No decision has been made as to which of the allies will receive the plants.

Slot Machine To Vend Newspapers

New York, Sept. 27—(U.P.)—A slot-machine newspaper vender which can make change for a nickel and tell a slug from a coin will get a try-out in the New York subway next week.

If it's successful, the inventor, Samuel Leschin, plans to put the six-foot high, red and chromium machine into mass production.

The mechanical newsboy is said to be almost completely foolproof. The change comes out with the paper, neatly wrapped in a cardboard container. It has a capacity of 200 newspapers.

VFW Tinkering With International Plan

Washington, Sept. 27—(U.P.)—The nation's second biggest veterans group, the Veterans of Foreign Wars, is tinkering with a plan for an international veterans' organization to work for peace.

This was learned today as leaders completed plans for a United Nations veterans' victory conference. It will be held in Chicago Oct. 1 as a curtain raiser on the VFW national convention Oct. 2-4.

"Yank" Will Cease With Dec. 28 Issue

Washington, Sept. 27—(U.P.)—Yank, the army's weekly combat magazine edited and written by enlisted men, will discontinue publication with the issue of Dec. 28, the war department announced today.

The war department explained that the need for spreading combat news between fighting men has ended. Other types of news are furnished to soldiers through more than 3,000 service publications and through the army's radio stations.

ARMY, NAVY MERGER EFFORTS ABANDONED

Washington, Sept. 27—(U.P.)—Congressional leaders said today that proposals to merge the army and navy into a single new department of national defense have been abandoned, at least for the present.

Chairman Carl Vinson, D., Ga., of the House Naval Affairs committee told newsmen flatly that "there will be no merger." He said there was "no chance" of the proposal being considered at this time and added: "I hope it's off forever."
