Magic Foods Babson Warns Certain Growers

Babson Gloucester, Mass., Sept. 28—(Special Correspondence) — We today eat food for two reasons: (1) To provide us with necessary starches, proteins, vitamins, minerals, etc., so as to give us growth and strength. (2) To give us the pleasure which comes through taste, odor and the formation of the gastric juices.

As Soil Runs Poorer

The best foods are those which naturally combine both (1) and (2) as outlined above. These were the foods which my ancestors raised on the virgin soils of Cape Ann which have since become run out. Not only were the vegetables and other products of the soil much better in those days, but also the cattle and poultry, including the milk, eggs and butter. If you have any doubt as to this, compare the taste of the blueberries which you, yourself, pick and the trout which you, yourself, catch with the frozen food and fish which you buy at the market.

Chemical Stocks May Be Safer Than Land Investment

All of the above means that before spending more money setting out peach and apple orchards, or orange and grapefruit groves, readers should carefully study this subject. Annual crops may be a much safer investment than tree crops or shrub crops; while money invested in good chemical stocks may be safer than if invested in farm land.
