## MEDFORD BLANKS GRIDIRON FOE BY 40 TO 0 MARGIN

Tornado's Defensive Tactics Hold Opponent Within Own 45; Whillock Punts

Medford's Black Tornado scored their second straight shut-out Friday night when they blanked the Marshfield high football team at Coos Bay by a 40-0 score.

The Tornado line, paced by Darrell Riggs, Nick Greene and Glenn Tingley, played an excellent defensive game during which Coos Bay did not get past their own 45-yard line.

Medford kicked to Coos Bay to start the ball game and the Pirates were held to three yards in three plays. On the fourth down the center passed the ball over the would-be-kicker's head and Medford recovered on the Coos Bay 35. An end run, with Bob Watson carrying the ball, picked up 25 yards, another end run gained four, and Jerry Ross crossed the goal line on a quarterback sneak for the first touchdown. Watson's kick was good and Medford led 7 to 0.

On the fourth play of the second quarter Watson skirted end and, as he was being tackled, lateraled to Glenn Bostwick who crossed the goal line standing up. Watson's kick was again good to give Medford a 14 to 0 margin. In the second period Medford was forced to kick for the only time this season. Howard Whillock booted the pignkin a mere 23 yards but Coos Bay was unable to take any advantage of the short punt.

"Dazzling" Jerry Clark returned the opening kickoff of the second half 20 yards and Watson was stopped cold in two attempts to crash the line. On the third down Watson found a hole through tackle and dashed 60 yards for the third score. The conversion attempt was blocked.

In the third period Bostwick made a beautiful 70-yard run down the side line to score standing up but a clipping penalty was called on Lynn Bessonette

and the play was called back. At outset of the final quarter Bostwick, on a reverse, trotted 25 yards for a touchdown and Watson's kick for the extra point was good. Earl Stelle, from his quarterback position, shot a 30-yard pass to Riggs in the end zone for another score. The try for point was blocked.

Lloyd Carr added Medford's last touchdown when he ran around end for 38 yards, crashing through five would-be tacklers in the last 20 yards. Stelle passed to Bill Singler for the extra point.

Medford lost another fourth period touchdown when Singler dropped a Stelle pass in the end zone with nobody near him.

## HOGAN'S SUB-PAR PLAY GIVES LEAD ROSE CITY MEET

Portland, Ore., Sept. 29—(U.P.) Pint-sized Benny Hogan, of Hershey, Pa., tonight topped the field with remarkable sub-par play in the \$14,333 Portland open golf tournament and with one day yet to play.

Hogan grabbed the lead with his opening round of 65, a competitive 7-under-par record for the tough Portland golf course, then followed with a 69 yesterday and more par busting today. He was four strokes under par for a 31 on the first nine holes.

The 136-pound Hogan outdrove and outputted the field today and can win the \$2,666 first money with a repeat performance Sunday.

Harold (Jug) McSpaden, Sanford, Me., clung to second place with a 69 today, for a total of 207. McSpaden was four under par on the back nine, his 33 being best of the tournament so far.

National Champion Byron Nelson, Toledo, winner of 17 tournaments this year, and Sammy Sneed, Hot Springs, Va., the defending champion, were next in the race to overtake Hogan. Nelson was one under par on each of his first two rounds then cut five under today with a 67 for a 64-hole total of 209. Sneed, who had duplicated Nelson's score until today, thought he had a similar 67 until the judges ruled against him on an out-of-bounds fall on the 11th hole to give him an official 68 for the day, or a total of 210.

The amateur brigade was headed by Ken Storey of Spokane, former Inland Empire and Pacific Northwest amateur champion whose 217 was only one above par.

## CUBS TAKE FLAG; TIGERS NEED WIN TODAY FOR TOGA

Borowy Hurls 4-3 Victory Over Pirates — Detroit Plays Browns Twice

Pittsburgh, Sept. 29—(U.P.)—The Chicago Cubs, with a former American league pitching ace doing the honors, won the 1945 National league pennant today, ending the St. Louis Cardinals three-year monopoly.

They won the right to represent the senior circuit in the World Series against either the Detroit Tigers or Washington Senators when they defeated the Pittsburgh Pirates in the first game of a double-header, 4 to 3. They also won the abbreviated nightcap, 5-0.

And the man who hurled them to the triumph, Fordham Hank Borowy, thus paid the club back in full for the \$100,000 which it put out for him to the New York Yankees in mid-season. It was his 11th victory against two defeats since joining the Cubs.

The Cubs' opponent may be decided tomorrow when the Tigers, needing only one victory to clinch the American league flag, meet the Browns in a twin bill at St. Louis. Should they lose both games, they will return to Detroit and meet the Senators in a play-off game Monday and the World Series will open in the park of the winner Wednesday.

The victory made the second game of the doubleheader and the single game which the Cubs have scheduled against the Pirates meaningless, just as it discounted the Cardinal victory over the Cincinnati Reds in the first game of a twin bill. For with only two games to go for both clubs, the triumphs meant that the Cubs maintained the lead with which they went into today's games.

It was anybody's ball game until the last out and Borowy needed help when the Pirates, striving to pay the Cubs back for what they did to them in 1938, threatened in the ninth.

They had gone into that frame tied at three-all, but the Cubs broke the deadlock in the top of the ninth when Hack walked and stopped at second on Roy Hughes' single. After Lowery sacrificed and Phil Cavarretta was passed intentionally to fill the bases, Hack scored on Pafko's long drive to Johnny Barrett. That turned out to be the biggest run the Cubs have scored this season.

## COUGARS CONQUER IDAHO 43 TO 12 IN FINAL OUTBURST

Moscow, Idaho, Sept. 29—(U.P.)—Washington State roared out a 12-12 third quarter tie today to rout the Idaho Vandals 43-12 in the opening Pacific Coast conference game for both elevens.

The Cougars, their lineup diluted with reserves, amassed 31 points in the last eight and one-half minutes.

Lippincott, freshman halfback, broke the tie with a touchdown pass from his running mate, Perault, and Malanca added the extra point. Ninety seconds later, Lazor, yearling center, took a lateral from Lippincott and travelled to a tally on the 31-yard line.

The next three came on pass interceptions. Within a minute, Guard Elwood Sturdevant intercepted an Idaho pass on the Vandals' 45-yard line and ran it back for a touchdown.

With two minutes left in the game, Dean Eggers, fullback, intercepted another Idaho toss in midfield and carried it a full 50 yards to the end zone.

And just as the gun ended the game, Frank Miyaki, freshman halfback, grabbed another Idaho pass on the Washington State 10 and rambled 90 yards.

## OREGON OUTGAINS WASHINGTON BUT LOSES GAME, 20-6

Interceptions and Penalties Nullify Robinson's Sturdy Attack

Seattle, Sept. 29—(U.P.)—The Washington Huskies today opened their Pacific Coast conference football season before a sell-out crowd of 35,000 fans with a 20 to 6 victory over a fighting Oregon eleven playing its first game since 1942.

Bob Reynolds, colored junior halfback from Portland, led the Webfoots heart-breaking attack that rolled up twice the yardage gained by Washington and earned 14 first downs to six.

But strategic pass interceptions and penalties lost the fight for Oregon.

Washington led at half-time 13 to 0 after a 32-yard touchdown run by Freshman Norm Sansregret who intercepted Johnson's pass and Marvin Hein, substitute end, snaged a pass from Joe Stone deep in the end zone in the last five seconds.

Stone passed 33 yards to Kennedy for the Huskies' third score early in the fourth period.

With less than two minutes to

play end Marlo, standing on the three-yard line in a corner, caught a long pass by Reynolds and fell over the line for the visitor's only score.

Oregon got off to a fast start with Anderson recovering Nelson's fumbled kick-off on the Washington 36-yard line but the Washington line which held when it had to stopped the attack on the nine.

Later in the period Reynolds shot a perfect strike to Fullback Bond in the end zone but Wingenfer, Washington halfback, knocked it down in the last split second.

And in the third period a 32-yard pass from Reynolds to End Hathaway which carried the Oregonians to the Huskies 21-yard line was called back because the Webfoots had a man in motion. Reynolds almost made up the loss with a twisting, turning 25-yard run around right end but again the Huskies held on their own 33.

Washington's five interceptions of Oregon passes more than wiped out the Webfoots ground superiority. Oregon gained 162 yards rushing to Washington's 79. Reynolds' passes gave the visitors 93 yards to 46 for Washington with eight completed out of 18 passes attempted.

It was the first full-grown Coast conference game here in three years and it was played under perfect conditions.
