

STATERS BATTLE FROM BEHIND TO TIE CAMP BEALE

Corvallis, Ore., Sept. 29—(U.P.)—An inexperienced Oregon State team came from behind in the last minute to tie a Camp Beale team, 14-14, here today.

It was the opening game of the season for Oregon State and the first played by the squad in three years.

The Camp Beale team scored first only three seconds before the end of the first half, when Montgomery, right end, took an 18-yard pass in the end zone.

Morgan took Walthall's pass for the extra point. The Staters hit paydirt on the fourth play of the final quarter when Fullback Stevens hit the line three yards for a touchdown after a 62-yard drive. McGuire of Portland converted, tying the score. The soldiers scored a few minutes later when Deterville recovered a fumble on the OSC 40. In three plays Camp Beale passed to a second touchdown.

With only 26 seconds remaining in the game, Garth Rouse of Woodburn, sub fullback, scored on fourth down from the one-yard line with McGuire kicking the goal.

TROY TOYS WITH BEARS, COP 13-2

Berkeley, Calif., Sept. 29—(U.P.)—Coach Jeff Cravath's University of Southern California Trojans took another long step toward their third successive bid to the Rose Bowl here this afternoon as they toyed with the fumbling University of California Bears for a 13-2 victory.

Led by Morris, who scored both USC touchdowns, the southerners were in charge of things all the way.

The two California points came in the third stanza when USC took the ball on its own six. From there Quarterback Peterson was tackled behind the goal line. That was the only time the Bears presented much in the way of a threat to the Southern California defense.

UCLANS LUCKY TO BEAT SAN DIEGO

Los Angeles, Sept. 29—(U.P.)—The University of California at Los Angeles staved off a passing attack by the San Diego Naval Training Station in the last period to win a hard-fought 20-14 victory before 20,000 fans today at the coliseum.

With Skip Rowland and Cal Rossi running the navy end and tackle for big gains, the Bruins opened up a 20-7 lead, only to almost lose the game as the navy marched through UCLA's poor pass defense.

The winners showed the same strong running attack that characterized their opener against Southern California last week, but Coach Bert Labrucherie remained unable to mend the glaring pass defects that cost him his first game in bigtime college competition.

FIRE BOMB RAIDS BAD AS ATOMICS

Mather Field, Cal., Sept. 29—(U.P.)—Firebomb raids by B-29 bombers leveled Japanese cities just about as effectively as the two atomic bomb strikes, Brig. Gen. Roger M. Ramey, commander of the 58th bombardment wing of the 29th Air Force, declared tonight.

Ramey arrived at Mather Field late today in the first plane of an ep masse movement back to the United States of three wings of the 20th Air Force. About 360 B-29s will arrive here in the next weeks. Nearly all of the men will be eligible for immediate discharge, Ramey said.

Telephone Company Places Instruments Faster Than Orders

N. R. Powley, president of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company, in connection with the release yesterday of dividend checks for the third quarter, made a comprehensive statement concerning the status of telephone installations and record high usage of long distance calls, according to a copy of the statement received by R. B. Hammond, local manager of the company.

Toll and long distance calls during the first eight months of the year reached new high levels, Powley said. An increase of about 18 per cent over the large traffic volumes of the same period a year ago and about 142 per cent over the same period in pre-Pearl Harbor days was noted.

Peak of the telephone shortage was in August when 305,000 unfilled orders were on hand, Powley's statement said. More than 298,000 were for service in residences. Telephones are now being installed faster than new orders come in, Powley added.

Lillard Searches For Foes to Face Lipscomb, Jones

Mack Lillard was busy seeking formidable opponents for lack Lipscomb, coast junior heavyweight champion, and Rouz. Rufus Jones for his Thursday night wrestling program at Medford armory. Jones and Lipscomb are reluctant to face each other but the mat impresario said yesterday he is trying to force them together.

However, Lillard said, if he cannot get them into the ring at the same time Thursday they will face outstanding opposition, probably in a double main event.

Lillard was in contact with Joe Lynam to determine if he is sufficiently recovered from a recurrent attack of malaria to be on the card.

Zamperini, Olympic Star, Heads Home

Honolulu, Sept. 29—(U.P.)—Capt. Louis Zamperini, former Olympic track star, arrived in Hawaii late yesterday aboard an ATC plane 28 months after leaving here in a bomber on a routine flight.

Zamperini's plane was forced down at sea and after 47 days on a raft he and two other men reached a Japanese island and were captured. Zamperini will remain here several days visiting friends and then will fly to his home town of Torrance, Calif.
