LT. COL. HORSLEY NEW COMMANDER AT CAMP WHITE

Camp White—Lt. Col. John W. Horsley, post executive of ficer at Camp White for the past two years today became its post commander, succeeding Lt. Col. Lou J. Farber who has been transferred to Pomona, Calif. The change also places him at the head of Service Command Unit 1913.

One of the first officers to arrive at Camp White while it was still in the final stages of completion, Col. Horsley came here from Camp San Luis Obispo, Calif., in July, 1942, to direct internal security and intelligence operations, and later became director of the post's intelligence division. He has been the camp executive officer since September, 1943.

After serving in World War I, Col. Horsley resumed his military career in 1928 with the U. S. National Guard at Brigham, Utah. He was called to active duty in March, 1941, serving first as commanding officer of a field artillery battery at Camp San Luis Obispo and later as S-1 and adjutant of the 22nd field artillery regiment.

Col. and Mrs. Horsley and their daughters Janet and Geraldine have made their home in Medford for the last three years at 735 Palm St. They have two sons in the army, one a member of a Japanese occupational unit.

USES URGES JOBS FOR HANDICAPPED

Officials of the United States employment service headquarters in Portland and the 28 Oregon field offices are taking advantage of the "employ the physically handicapped week", proclaimed by President Harry S. Truman and Governor Earl Snell for October 7 to 14, to publicize the work they are doing in counseling and placing physically handicapped persons throughout the state.

"Nearly 3,000 physically handicapped workers—more than two-thirds of whom were veterans—have been placed on permanent jobs in Oregon by the local USES offices since the

first of this year," says Lee C. Stoll, stage director. Of this number, 85 have been placed in this area by Lewis Ulrich, local USES office manager.

Both Stoll and Ulrich expressed appreciation over the nationwide attention being focused by the proclamation on the problems surrounding the rehabilitation and reemployment of the physically handicapped. As estimated 16,000 amputations alone have been sustained by American servicemen, not to mention the hundreds of other types of military casualties since Pearl Harbor, according to J. Richard Smurtnwaite Jr., state veterans' employment representative, and about 160,000 civilians a year are permanently handicapped out of something like 800,000 industrial accidents yearly in the United States.

ASHLAND COUNCIL EYES C STREET IMPROVEMENT

Ashland, Oct. 4.—(U.P.)—Extension of C street from North Pioneer avenue to the Plaza area was approved by the city council Tuesday night. A petition will be made to the Oregon State Highway commission to make the survey of the proposed project so as to co-ordinate it with the Plaza improvement project. Pressing needs for more business area and future growth of the city was pointed out as reason for the C street extension.

It would entail a cost of approximately \$40,000 and necessitate removal of three buildings and part of two others.

BIG APPLEGATE BARN DESTROYED BY BLAZE

A barn belonging to Albert Collings of Big Applegate and containing about 50 tons of hay was destroyed by fire about 2:30 p. m. Sunday. Cause of the fire was unknown.

Two wagons, considerable lumber stored in the barn, and other miscellaneous articles were destroyed. Volunteer fire fighters saved the house and other outbuildings.

ENROLLMENT AT SENIOR HIGH FAR OVER LAST YEAR

Enrollment of Medford senior high school on the third day of school this fall was 588 students, as compared to 519 for the third day last year according to figures released from the office of the school superintendent, E. H. Hedrick. This represents an increase of 15.3 per cent.

Last year's third day enrollment of 519 represented a loss of 10.2 per cent as compared to 1943, this being attributed largely to the number of young men called into service. Hedrick is of the opinion that the enrollment will increase slightly within the next several days since a few students are remaining in harvest work for the present.

Junior high school enrollment now numbers 730 students, the superintendent reports. Last year's top enrollment never reached 700 students, and the permanent enrollment was recorded as 632. This fall's figures represent an increase of 15.5 per cent. Elementary schools also show an increase of 13.5 over last year, the office reports.

VETERANS HOSPITAL AT ASHLAND SOUGHT

Ashland, Oct. 4.—Ashland voters will be asked to approve purchase of a site for a veterans' hospital here if such a project is approved, it was learned today. City Councilman Jacob Weitzel, Walter Redford and City Attorney William Briggs were appointed by Mayor T. S. Wiley to attend a conference with General Omar Bradley, head of the veterans' administration when he visits the Roseburg hospital soon.

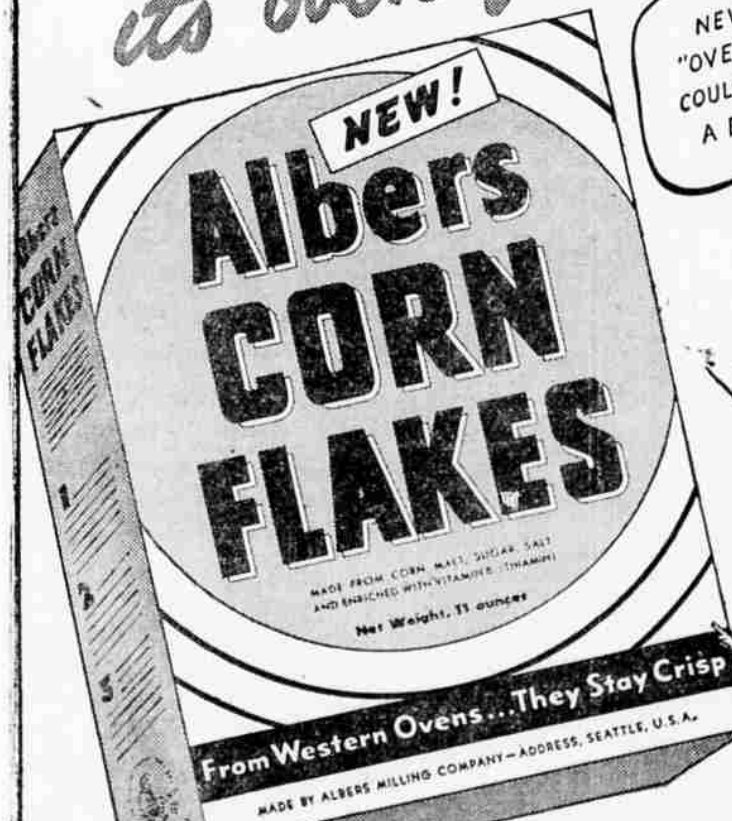
