Price Support Period Hinges On War's End

The January 1 following the date of the formal declaration of the end of hostilities, by either the president or congress, will mark the beginning of the two-year period during which the government is committed to support farm prices at fixed levels. If the declaration is made before the end of this year, the price support period will extend through 1947 and 1948. But if the formal proclamation is not issued until after January 1, then prices will be supported through 1948.

Three groups of commodities are affected. First are the "basic" crops, of which wheat is the only one grown in Oregon. Loans at 90 per cent parity are mandatory.

The second group are the Steagall commodities. These include hogs, eggs, chickens, turkeys, butterfat, milk, dry peas, dry beans, potatoes and flaxseed. For those, the price support is 90 per cent of parity or comparable price.

The third group consists of about 114 other commodities now receiving price support of some kind. There's no fixed post-war price support policy for this group. But it has been the policy of congress that prices of these commodities be kept in fair parity relationship to the Steagall and basic commodities, to the extent that funds are available.

These commitments are provided by existing legislation. But carrying out the support price programs will, of course, require congressional appropriations. It might be wise for farmers to be thinking about the possibility of such appropriations being conditioned on a requirement that

Set-Aside Order On Turkeys Offer

The USDA has terminated its set-aside order on turkeys in Oregon and other states for government procurement which was put into effect to obtain an adequate supply to provide the traditional holiday dinners for the men and women of the armed services. The nation's turkey producers have a record crop ready for the holiday season which is expected to be adequate to meet demands of both the armed forces and civilians for the holiday season.

Dairy Production Payment Now Due

Dairy farmers and dairymen now can make application to their county AAA office for another dairy production payment. This one is for sales made during the three months of July, August and September. The payment rates are 55¢ per hundredweight for whole milk and 13¢ per pound for butterfat. It's a good idea to file your application just as soon as you get your sales slips or cream checks for September. But in any event, the application must be filed before November 31. That's the closing date for July-September payments. The payment rates on October 1 went up to 70¢ on whole milk and 17¢ on butterfat. These winter rates will remain in effect through March, 1946. Payments for production in the next three months (October through December) will be made in January.

Harvest Now For Vegetable Storage

Vegetables that are to be stored should be harvested now before frosts occur. If frosted, the storage life is materially shortened. Squash and pumpkins should be carefully picked as any cuts or bruises in the skin allow rot to develop. They should be stored in a warm dry place. In the attic or near the furnace in the basement are good places.

Onions should be dug, crated and left in the field as long as the weather remains warm in order to cure them. They should be

stored in a cool place but where they will not freeze.

Carrots, beets, turnips and parsnips can be left in the ground all winter. Additional protection can be obtained by mounding dirt over the rows.

Dry beans should be fumigated. Pour one tablespoon of carbon bisulphide over the beans in any tight jar or can up to five gallons. Seal and leave for 48 hours. Air thoroughly. This material is extremely inflammable so handle with care and out of doors.
