

POLIO OUTBREAK CLOSES UP TOWN

Billings, Mont., Oct. 9.—(U.P.)—The city of Billings, third largest in the state, resembled a ghost town today as public gathering places were quarantined in an attempt to combat an outbreak of infantile paralysis.

City health officials said that 46 cases including eight fatalities, had been reported since Sept. 3.

Children under 18 years of age were restricted to their homes in Billings and Yellowstone counties, and police began strict enforcement of an order closing schools, churches, theaters, cocktail lounges, bowling alleys, ice cream parlors, dance halls and card and game rooms.

CATALINA REOPENING
Avalon, Cal., Oct. 9.—(U.P.)—Santa Catalina Island resorts, closed since 1941, today anticipated their largest tourist crowds in history next spring and summer. Resumption of regular passenger boat service to the famed island is scheduled within 60 days by the Wilmington Transportation Co.

LEFTISTS GAIN IN NORWEGIAN VOTE

Oslo, Oct. 9.—(U.P.)—Labor and other leftist parties appeared today to have won majorities in the Norwegian parliament elections. On the basis of the first 250,000 votes counted, observers estimated that the new parliament would include 78 laborites, 28 conservatives, 22 liberals, 11 agriculturists, nine Christian people's party members and seven communists.

Counting of votes in the Oslo, Bergen and Aker district in the vicinity of Oslo was scheduled to begin today.

The communists and laborites together may have gained a working majority in the 150 member parliament, which succeeds the one held over since 1936. Norway's parliamentary election was the first in any liberated European country.

AUTO FLOOD COMING
Los Angeles, Oct. 9.—(U.P.)—Fifty million automobiles—more than double the prewar total—will jam American highways within 15 years, C. K. Whittaker, president of Studebaker Pacific Corp., said today. Whittaker told an auto dealers' meeting that early postwar models would cost 20 to 25 per cent more than prewar.

Japs Had Tricky Raid Detector In Palace Grounds

Tokyo, Oct. 9.—(U.P.)—An air raid warning center built in one corner of Emperor Hirohito's palace grounds two years before the outbreak of war was the "world's trickiest" but failed to give warning of Lt. Gen. James H. Doolittle's dramatic first raid on Tokyo in 1942, experts of the U. S. Fifth air force said today.

Technicians from air force headquarters inspected a series of intricate gadgets which flashed 10,000 separate lights like giant pinball machines. They detected that the raid could be expected four hours away but had been unable to warn the Tokyo metropolitan area of the approach of Doolittle's low-flying raiders.

Gadgets which almost filled the huge bombproof building steadily decreased in value, Japanese operators said, as American submarines sank offshore picket boats which served as advance posts for the system.

'Conchie' Awarded Highest Honor For Feats of Bravery

Washington, Oct. 9.—(U.P.)—A conscientious objector has won the congressional medal of honor.

The man is Pfc. Desmond T. Doss, Lynchburg, Va. He won the medal for outstanding bravery as a member of a medical corps on Okinawa the war department announced today.

Doss is believed to be the first conscientious objector ever to win the highest award for valor. He was wounded twice. His beliefs did not permit him to bear arms, but he was agreeable to serving in the army in a non-combatant post.

The 28-year-old soldier, although he bore no arms, performed so many feats of heroism on Guam, Leyte, and Okinawa that his name became a symbol of gallantry throughout the 77th infantry "Statue of Liberty" division.

Tax Dodging Eyed In Film Capital

Hollywood, Oct. 9.—(U.P.)—Hollywood tax-evasion practices were under close scrutiny today by Internal Revenue Commissioner Joseph D. Nunan, Jr., and his aides.

One of the chief practices, Nunan said, was to incorporate a picture, issue stock to a few stars, and later buy it back at high valuations. The increase would then be listed as a "capital gain" instead of as income.

STRIKERS RETURN
Wilmington, Cal., Oct. 9.—(U.P.) Returns of 300 more striking Union Oil Co. workers today permitted partial production at its Wilmington Refinery, idle since last week's walkout.
