HI GRUMPY. HOW'S YOUR CALCIUM METABOLISM?

Before the war I began preparing a Little Lesson especially for the old folks. By consent of Dr. Frederick Filsinger of Buffalo, whose contributions to medical literature on the neglected subject of the care of elderly patients inspired me, I intended to issue the booklet under the title "The Forgotten People," which Dr. Filsinger had used for one of his articles.

You see, I had always contrived to be hard boiled enough to discourage them from telling me their symptoms. It is not that I have no concern for the health and happiness of the old folks. Nothing would please me more than to give the old folks a long distance diagnosis and the right treatment for their ailments. As a pastime that would be nearly as enjoyable as doing a crossword puzzle or reading a good mystery story. But I can't do that. It would not be fair even to the correspondent who believes I could do as well as the doctor who examines and knows him or her, I'm a quack—there's no denying that, but withal I'm a conscientious geek and I like to sleep nights.

At first blush the project seemed alluring. Except such occasional discussions of the health problems of the aged as those of Dr. Filsinger which excited my interest, there had been little or nothing done about the matter in recent years. But since Dr. Filsinger published his first papers we have had a sudden, and apparently hasty output of textbooks on geriatrics (old age and its disease), none of which is worth the trouble of reading, and a crop of popular books for the old folks, which are a good deal better, I think.

Still and all, Cicero, Dr. Osler, Dr. Ernest P. Boas, Dr. Oliver Wendell Holmes, Luigi Corrado and George Cheyne said practically all there was to say about old age long ago. Some of the things they said were not entirely right in the light of our present knowledge, but if you undertake to write about senility you must quote these old boys with due credit or else twist their ideas into different words and pretend you have never heard of them.

Books for the old folks which I can recommend are "Treatment of the Patient Past Fifty," by Ernst P. Boas, M. D., The

Year Book Publishers, Inc., Chicago, and "You Are Younger Than You Think," by Martin Gumpert, M. D., Duell, Sloan and Pearce, New York. The former is perhaps intended for medical readers, although there is much in it that any layman may read with profit. The latter is for popular reading. Any book dealer can get these for you if they are not in your public library.

QUESTIONS & ANSWERS. My wife had an operation which included, among other things "repair of one ovary." Does that mean removal of the ovary? I have repeatedly asked the physician in charge but he always manages to send me away without an answer. W. E. M. Answer—Repair hardly means removal. In any case the patient has a right to know exactly what was done at operation. If the doctor is on the level he will explain, in plain words the patient can understand, what was done. Perhaps the doctor prefers to inform the patient herself.

Wash the Wheat. We have whole wheat here to feed our rabbits, but it is very dusty and dirty. If I boil it will be boiling destroy some of the vitamin B. (R. R.) Answer—Wash the wheat by running water through it in colander or sieve. Cooking heat destroys some of the B1. Have to use plain wheat in the everyday diet.
