Cane Fruits Care Due At This Time

Cane fruits should be pruned, trellised and sprayed with Bordeaux mixture at this time. In pruning, the old canes that fruited this year should all be removed. The new canes that are vigorous should be put upon the wires and the weak canes removed. It is best to leave about eight canes to a hill.

The new canes that are trellised should be cut back to eight or ten feet but this cutting back should be delayed until spring. If cut back this fall, a severe winter may cause dying back from the cut.

After being put on the trellis, the canes should be sprayed thoroughly with Bordeaux mixture. Use 1 pound of commercial one package Bordeaux in five gallons of water.

Orchard Cover Crops Should Be Planted

If cover crops have not already been planted, they should be as soon as possible. Sixty pounds of common or Hungarian vetch per acre or a mixture of 40 pounds of vetch and 30

pounds of oats per acre are most generally used. On non-irrigated land or where early cultivation is desired, it may be best to use rye in place of the oats. Abruzzi rye is a new type of winter rye that grows all winter and by early spring a fair crop is ready to turn under.

New York and Harlem reached a new high at 350 up 51 points and Babington Coal Railroad hit 300 for a gain of 30 points and also a new high.

Among the leaders, the steels were mixed in a fractional advance. Motors rallied to around the previous close after an early decline.

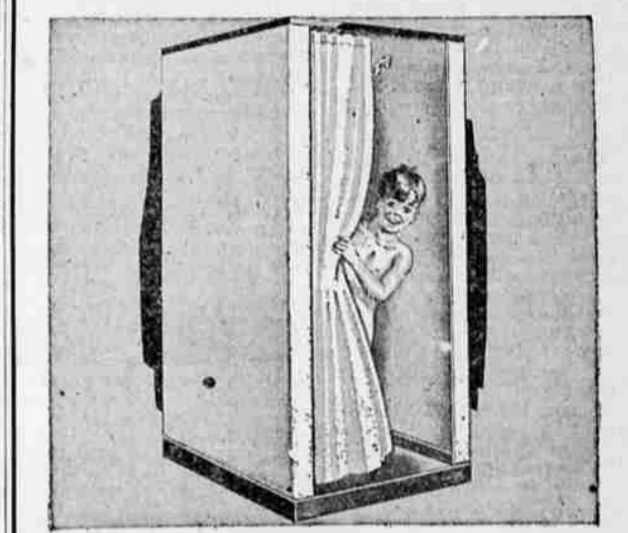
