DEATH SOLUTION AWAITS AUTOPSY

Wall Township, N. J., Oct. 11—(U.P.)—Police awaited the results of an autopsy today to determine how Mrs. Grace McMurray, 32, met her death after beating her two small daughters to death with a plumber's hammer.

Mrs. McMurray's burned and blackened body was found in the living room of her white stucco bungalow yesterday after a neighbor told police that she had threatened suicide because she was sure her husband was "running around with another woman."

McMurray is in New Mexico on a business trip, police said. Police were unable to say whether Mrs. McMurray died of the burns she suffered in a bedroom fire or whether she had attempted death in some other manner and after arranging for the house to catch fire through the use of a blow torch and a can of cleaning fluid.

MONEY DELIVERY FAILURE CHARGED

Leonard L. Lincoln of Prospect has filed suit in circuit court against Norman L. Cooper, operator of a stage line between Prospect and Medford for the recovery of \$429.50. The action filed yesterday alleges that Jack Baker, an agent and employee of the defendant, failed to make delivery of the sum in currency and checks to the United States National bank on Oct. 7.

The complaint sets forth that an arrangement was made recently between the plaintiff and defendant, whereby to carry and deliver deposits from time to time to the bank at the rate of \$1 per deposit. It is further claimed that Lincoln was instructed by Cooper to deliver the sum to Jack Baker, an employee of the defendant. It is then alleged Baker failed to make the bank delivery and plaintiff alleges he has reason to believe "Baker absconded with the money."

PEACH, APRICOT SPRAY ADVISED

Peach and apricot trees should be sprayed sometime this month for control of peach blight and peach leaf curl, according to announcement from the county agent's office.

A properly prepared 10-10-100 home-made Bordeaux is unsurpassed for this spray. If commercially prepared Bordeaux is used, use 20 pounds per 100 gallons. If a copper substitute is used, it should be used at seven pounds per 100 gallons. The addition of one quart of oil emulsion to 100 gallons of the above sprays will improve them. Spray thoroughly.
