

CORNELL BEATEN BY TIGERS; ARMY MAULS MICHIGAN

Navy and Irish Victors, Also Ohio State, Indiana and Purdue

New York, Oct. 13—(U.P.)—Most football games went according to the script today, but there was one resounding upset, the 14 to 6 defeat of Cornell's big red eleven by a supposedly clueless Tiger team from Princeton. It was the biggest surprise of the national program.

There was a surprise to many in the strong stand of Michigan against an Army team that has been classed as the greatest of all collegiate gridiron combats. The Cadets topped the Wolverines, 28 to 7 but not until they had been in their biggest battle to date.

Navy's Midshipmen also had not too much margin to spare in beating a stubborn Penn State team, 28 to 0.

Columbia's Lions, given a strong sermon by Coach Lou Little at half time, went out to practice what he had preached and made four touchdowns to beat Yale, 27 to 13.

In other eastern games, Michigan State topped Pittsburgh, 12 to 7, while Pennsylvania walked over a North Carolina team, 49 to 0. Harvard edged Rochester, 21 to 13. Rhode Island used a field goal to beat Maine, 10 to 7, and Drexel prolonged City College's three year losing streak, 19 to 7.

Ohio State's two-year winning streak was in jeopardy for a time but the Buckeyes eventually opened up for a 12 to 0 victory over Wisconsin, while Purdue romped to a 40 to 0 win over Iowa. Indiana handed Nebraska a 54-14 beating. Notre Dame, coasting along gave Dartmouth a 34 to 0 trouncing. Minnesota ran into trouble from Fort Warren, but gained a 14 to 0 triumph.

The top teams of the Southland moved ahead without difficulty. The surprise was Duke's narrow escape from defeat by Wake Forest. Duke squeaked out a 26 to 19 win. Alabama racked up a 55 to 0 score over South Carolina. Georgia Tech defeated How-

ard, 43 to 0. Georgia was a 48 to 6 victor over Kentucky. Tennessee topped Chattanooga, 30 to 0, and Mississippi State won from Detroit, 41 to 6.

In the southwest, Texas won its traditional game with Oklahoma, 12 to 7, and Rice spilled Tulane 13 to 7. Baylor won from Arkansas, 23 to 13.

In the Rockies, New Mexico won over Colorado College by the baseball score of 6 to 4. Colorado topped Colorado A & M, 21 to 6 and Utah defeated Montana State, 44 to 13.

Missouri beat Iowa State, 13 to 7, in the only Big Six conference game.

GAME BODY BUYS HERMISTON FARM

Portland, Ore., Oct. 13—(U.P.)—The State Game commission today approved purchase of a 280-acre farm near Hermiston to replace the now out-moded Pendleton game farm. Owned by Fred W. McMurray, the farm comprises 280 acres of irrigated land and 10 of brush and was used for raising alfalfa and hay. Price was set at \$35,000.

PORTLAND GROUPS ASK DEATH PROBE

Portland, Ore., Oct. 13—(U.P.)—Gov. Earl Snell was formally requested today by representatives of several Portland groups to direct the attorney general to conduct a grand jury investigation into the death of Erwin Jones, negro.

Jones was killed on August 21 by a police detective when officers entered Jones apartment in Guilds Lake in search of Scott Thomas, wanted on a murder charge. A verdict of justifiable homicide was returned by a coroner's jury Wednesday after a two-day inquest.

It was asserted in the letter to the governor that "the verdict constitutes an invitation to lawlessness, a serious threat to the security of all persons in their own homes and a grave miscarriage of justice."

GEORGIA SOLONS HELP GRID STAR GET OUT OF ARMY

Washington, Oct. 13—(U.P.)—Georgia's democratic senators said tonight they helped obtain an army discharge for S. Sgt. Charles Trippi, star football player, who plans to return to the University of Georgia.

Sens. Walter F. George and Richard B. Russell said they visited Secretary of War Robert P. Patterson Monday in behalf of Trippi, who had only 41 of the necessary 70 points for discharge.

George said he had "no apology" to make for aiding Trippi whom he considered a "genuine hardship case." Russell issued a written statement saying that the army had used Trippi for nothing except playing football, "which is certainly not an essential army duty."

Tampa (Fla.) newspapers criticized the release of Trippi, charging that the war department had listened to "Georgia politicians who want a Bowl football team."
