37 Nations Meet To Fix Diet For War Poor Nations

Quebec, Oct. 17—(U.P.)—Thirty-five nations met here today to formally create the international food and agriculture organization which will set the minimum nutritional standard for the people of war-ravaged countries.

L. B. Pearson, Canadian ambassador to the United States and chairman of an interim FAO, predicted that more than 20 of the nations would sign the FAO constitution at a special ceremony late today.

Among the 35 nations were three observer nations—Russia, Syria and Lebanon. However, FAO officials speculated that Russia would assume more than an observer's role since it has sent a 25-man delegation to the sessions.
