

### Captain Darrell Riggs Probably Out Of Tornado Lineup Against Pelicans

The Medford-Klamath Falls football game, to be played in Klamath Falls Friday night, will be broadcast over radio station KMED, beginning at 8 o'clock. It was announced today.

Captain Darrell Riggs, who is one of the outstanding linemen in Oregon high school grid circles, will probably be out of the crucial game with Klamath Falls Friday night, Coach Al Simpson said today. Riggs, 185-pound left end, suffered a broken nose in the Eureka game here last week and, although he has returned to school Monday after a week-end in the hospital, he has not reported for practice.

Use of medicines to relieve the pain have left the lanky flankman "woozy" and it is unlikely he will be in physical condition to play, even with a nose guard, Simpson said.

Lynn Bessonet and Howard Whitlock, starting tackles, have been battling with a touch of flu for the past few days but will probably be ready to go—for at least part of the game, the mentor declared. Remainder of the team was in good shape this morning, after a couple of days of heavy workouts for the battle at Klamath Falls.

Klamath Falls is sparked by a pair of backs by the names of Edwards and Redkey who are good men in any league and are not to be sold short against the Tornado. Both are much faster than the average high school backfield man and will be away for a touchdown whenever they can break into the clear.

The Pelicans have played four games, breaking even with two wins and two losses. Last time out they dropped a 13-12 decision to Grants Pass in a Southern Oregon league clash. Medford, on the other hand, has amassed

a total of 198 points to their opponents' seven in winning four straight.

### TALENT TO FACE POINTERS FRIDAY

Inglewood, Calif., Oct. 17—(U.P.)—It's a wide-open scramble today for Saturday's \$75,000 Gold Cup at Hollywood Park, a race that had been considered the exclusive property of Busher until the prize fell to him.

A formidable quintet, Mrs. A. L. Price's Sirde, W.L. Ranch's Paperboy, Miss C. Jeim's Bull Reigh, Mrs. Howard Hawk's War Valor, and T. W. Ranch's Man O' Glory, jumped into the breach left by Busher, whose ankle swelled yesterday after a workout.

These five thoroughbreds are likely to share equal support from the anticipated throng of 50,000 fans.

The sudden turn of events may also lure as many as 20 starters for the mile and one-quarter classic. Before Busher was counted out, the list of candidates was expected to boil down to approximately 15.

### Inquest Will Be Held In Death Of Mexican Fighter

Los Angeles, Oct. 17—(U.P.)—An inquest was scheduled today in the death of Mexican National Alberto Silva, 18, after an Ocean Park arena boxing match.

Attorney David Marcus, representing the Mexican consul, asked Coroner Ben H. Brown to investigate Silva's death, charging that the youth was given a license to fight professionally without previous training.

Silva suffered a brain concussion in his bout Oct. 9 with Felix Miramontez, former Golden Gloves tournament winner. Referee Jimmy Wallace, who stopped the match after four rounds because Silva was taking too many head blows, awarded Miramontez a technical knockout.

Marcus said Silva, brought here from Mexico a month ago as an agricultural worker, was granted a boxing permit on the strength of statements by his manager, Eddie Stanley, that he was ready for the fight and his own avowal that he had previous professional experience.

The Southern Oregon conference football picture has slimmed down to the Grants Pass-Medford game on the Cavemen's turf Oct. 26 to determine the league championship. Klamath Falls was eliminated by the Cavemen 13-12 last week while the Pelicans turned Ashland back 13 to 6 two weeks ago. Grants Pass goes to Ashland Friday night while Medford tackles Klamath Falls but no change in the league picture is anticipated.

Championship contenders in Oregon's four high school districts are gradually coming to the fore. In district 1, Hood River and The Dalles possess unbeaten and untied records against district foes. Hood River showed lots of strength in beating a good club from Gresham by a 25 to 12 score last week while The Dalles took only limbering-up exercises in trouncing Prineville 20-0.

Pendleton is also undefeated in district 1, but has been tied, 12 to 12, by LaGrande. Medford and North Bend possess unblemished records in district 2 play. North Bend's latest conquest was a 40 to 25 victory over Coquille, last year's runner-up in the district.

In districts three's southern sub-division, Eugene and Corvallis, both unbeaten in league competition, come together while Woodburn and Canby, both with unscathed records, get together at Woodburn Cottage Grove, also yet to be whipped in district 3, entertains Sweet Home.

Three teams with perfect records in district three's northern sub-division risk their standings Friday. McMinnville plays at Tigard; West Linn and Beaverton, both with three wins apiece, vie at Beaverton, while Portland's Columbia Prep, unbeaten and untied, has an open date.

In District 4, representing Portland schools, only Grant is unbeaten and untied. The Generals go against tough Benson Tech Friday.

### Fred Apostoli Not To Make Comeback In Boxing Business

### SEATTLE COURSE DRAWS CRITICISM OF PGA OFFICIAL

Seattle, Oct. 17—(U.P.)—Seattle golfers were up in arms today over reported insinuations by PGA Tournament Manager Fred Corcoran that the Broadmoor course, scene of the \$10,000 Seattle Open, is not of championship caliber.

Corcoran was quoted in a Chicago interview as saying that in future all links would be surveyed before being rated as championship courses. The survey would take in length, hazards, greens and terrain.

M. O. Anderson, Broadmoor Golf club president, said he believed Corcoran's statement was prompted by the fact that Seattle Amateur Harry Glivan tied for second place with Pro Harold (Jug) McSpaden at 272, eight strokes under par for 72 holes.

"Why didn't Corcoran survey the Broadmoor layout before the tournament when he was in the state instead of waiting until he returned to Chicago," Anderson asked. "During the Seattle Open, even some of the big name golfers ran up embarrassingly high scores."

Canton, O. (U.P.)—The Allies would do better to harness Germany's technicians and scientists than to force her to pay huge reparations for war damage, according to Martin Fleischmann, of the Timken Roller Bearing Co. here.
