ASHLAND PLANS STREET EXTENSION

Ashland, Oct. 18—The city council Tuesday night authorized purchase of two houses on Oak street to make way for the C street expansion program in connection with the Plaza improvement and establishment of a larger business district.

Discussion of possibility of converting the city warehouse at First and C streets into business buildings was also heard, as was location of the new fire station across First street from the city warehouse.

Sale of city property to the Jansen Edmondson Lumber company was approved and other street expansion work discussed. The council ordered reconnaissance surveys be made immediately to determine sources of additional city water supply.

CURB RAMPS GIVE AID TO WOUNDED VETERANS

Battle Creek, Mich. (U.P.)—Curbing ramps for the benefit of wounded veterans at the Percy Jones hospital have been installed in the shopping district here by the city.

Patients from the hospital, an army amputation center, head for town when they get a wheel chair or crutches and to facilitate their needs, sidewalk crossing ramps also have been built on the shortest route from the hospital to town.

1944 BABY CROP LESS THAN IN YEAR BEFORE

The stork during 1944 delivered to Jackson county homes 917 babies, according to vital statistics compiled by the county clerk's office. This is 76 less infants than in 1943 when 993 births were recorded. Deputies in the county clerk's office estimate that between 30 and 40 per cent of the births were to military service people.

BUTTER CEILINGS GOING UP NOV. 8

Washington, Oct. 18—(U.P.)—Retail ceiling prices for butter will go up five or six cents a pound on Nov. 8.

The Office of Reconversion Director John W. Snyder today directed the Reconstruction Finance Corp. to remove the five-cent-a-pound government subsidy on butter and authorized the office of price administration to make compensating increases in retail butter prices.

The RFC immediately announced that the subsidy payments would end Oct. 31. OPA said the resulting retail price increases would be five to six cents a pound but would not go into effect until Nov. 8. Creameries and wholesalers will be permitted to add the five cents to their ceiling prices Oct. 31.
