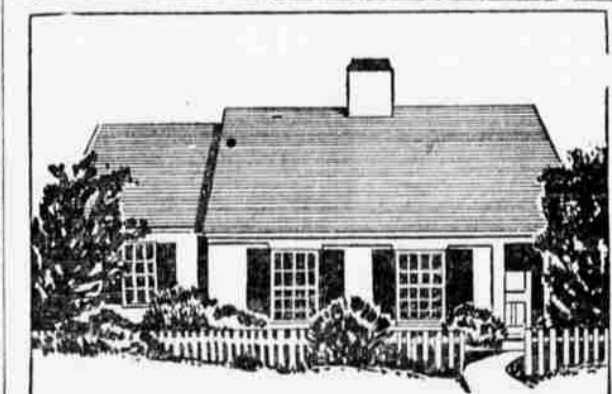

## NURSERY SCHOOL IN NEW LOCATION

The Medford Nursery school will not close, as was previously announced, but will open in a new location Nov. 1, according to an announcement made this morning. The school, now operating at 22 Geneva street, will move to 325 East Jackson street where a house has been purchased.

It was stated that Mrs. Etnel Tennant will continue as director of the school and that the same staff and equipment will be retained.

For a considerable period the school has been operated as the war nursery school with federal funds supplied under the Lanham act and under the supervision of the public school system of Medford. It was at first announced that funds provided under the Lanham act would terminate Oct. 31, 1945, but news released yesterday stated that the house appropriations committee had recommended continuation of the federal aid for child care centers until March 1, 1946.

## Ammonia Seen As Fuel Possibility For Large Trucks

London—(U.P.)—Dr. James P. Lawrie, science writer for The Scotsman, has reported that ammonia, familiar as a means of refrigeration and for ice-making, has "possibilities" as a fuel for heavy-duty motor traffic.

Lawrie says that its use as a fuel for motor buses was first developed in Belgium, where, in 1943, the first bus was equipped. Since that eight buses have been in operation, covering tens of thousands of miles with "most satisfactory results."

Lawrie adds that there are valuable anti-knock qualities in ammonia, at least over coal-gas. He says that coal-gas requires 2.66 times as much air in combustion as does ammonia, the latter having an added advantage of greater expansion when burned.

Judging from the high compression ratios which ammonia tolerates, it may safely be assumed that its comparative octane number is rather higher than 100.
