## STATE SCHOOLS TURN DOWN BIDS FOR EDUCATION

Living Quarters Practically Non-Existent; Solution is Frantically Sought.

Portland, Ore., Oct. 19.—(U.P.)—"Come back around January 1st; maybe we can help you then." No, not the answer of a harried state school official, but the plea of college administration officials plagued by an acute housing shortage at Oregon schools of higher education.

At the University of Oregon alone it has been estimated that 200 students were turned away this fall term because of inadequate housing facilities. The critical situation, prevalent all over the United States, in Oregon has hit hardest at the two major state systems of higher education schools—the University of Oregon at Eugene and Oregon State College at Corvallis—whose enrollments leaped way beyond expectations.

**Vets Seek Schooling**  
To those who must handle the problem, the most heart-breaking part centers around returning veterans, many of whom are married. Eager to take advantage of the GI Bill of Rights they arrive on the campuses, only to find housing, especially for families, just plain nonexistent.

State system officials reported they are making every effort "within their powers and finances," to solve the problem. They admit they are worried, for they fear a whole generation of college education will be lost unless quick action is taken. And they generally agree that temporarily the federal government should step in—at least to help out the veterans who have been promised an education.

Going by the normal rate of increase over the last 10 years, 200 men and 100 women annually. Oregon's enrollment should more than double for the school year 1947-48.

State system officials are angling for 50 housing units from Richland, Wash., for use of married students and it may be possible to get additional temporary housing from Vancouver, Wash.

Eugene also has on the string 40 apartment units from former NYA and CCC camps where remodeling stopped during the war.

## COAST GUARD RECRUITS ELIGIBLE UNDER G.I. ACT

Portland, Oct. 19.—Seventeen-year-old recruits now enlisting in the U. S. Coast Guard still are eligible for benefits of the GI Bill of Rights, reports O. L. Puckett, officer-in-charge of the Coast Guard recruiting station at 307 Pioneer Post Office, Portland.

Time limitations on the educational, loan and readjustment allowance features of the law have been extended, Puckett states, to apply to recruits enlisting before October 6, 1946.

The Coast Guard is seeking recruits in the 17-year-age group to help man its ships, air stations and bases in the peacetime years. Applicants must have at least two years' high school, parent's consent and U. S. citizenship.
