United Company To 'Spud In' Well Near Burns' October 29

J. H. Dawson, president of The United Company of Oregon, Inc., stated Saturday that drilling of the company's first oil well, to be known as United Fay No. 1, will be commenced October 29.

The public is invited to attend the spudding-in ceremony at noon on that date. The well is located twenty-five miles southeast of Burns, near the Burns-Crane Highway, and persons intending to spend the day there should bring lunches because of distance from any eating place. Coffee and refreshments will be served at the cook-house.

The company's Oil Well Supply No. 3 rotary drilling rig, capable of drilling to 10,000 feet, is one of the best drilling outfits thus far brought into Oregon, Mr. Dawson said. After studying reports of leading geologists the company decided that the structure, being one of five lying in Harney County offers the best prospects for bringing in a producing well, and geophysical tests of the structure indicate that this drilling location is on or near the apex of the structure, according to Mr. Dawson.
