

## 23 YOUNG WOMEN ENJOY RESIDENCE AT G. C. CLUBHOUSE

Twenty-three young women enjoyed the co-operative living plan of the Girls' Community club during the past year according to the annual report of the club matron to the Community Chest board. The majority of these were from smaller communities in Jackson county and have greatly appreciated the one year resident term available, the matron states.

The resident girls held numerous parties, dinners and dances and one held her wedding in the club rooms. "The service rendered these young women can not be valued in dollars and cents," the report states. "Over 250 girls have lived at the clubhouse without a single case of delinquency ever reported. All girls accepted must be employed in the minimum wage bracket or else attending business schools."

## Help For Disabled Blocked by Solon Says DAV Chief

Chicago, Oct. 22—(U.P.)—National Commander Milton D. Cohn of the Disabled American Veterans charged today that Rep. John Rankin, D. Miss., blocked legislation for disabled veterans by refusing to relinquish the chairman ship of a minor committee.

Cohn made the charge in asking the DAV, meeting in annual convention, to adopt a resolution asking that new, major committees in the senate and house be created to handle veterans legislation.

He said most of the legislation for disabled veterans was routed through "the so-called World War Veterans committee" headed by Rankin.

"The chairman consistently refuses to agree on veterans affairs being in the hands of a

major committee because he would be obliged to relinquish his place on other committees," Cohn charged.

A British engineering unit and experts from the War office had been working since the end of the war preparing the demolition job, one of the largest in the history of the British army.

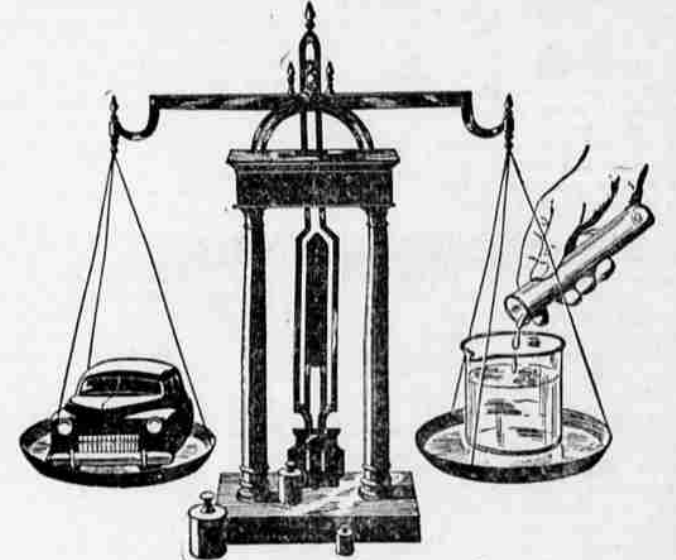
**EIGHT DIE IN CRASH**

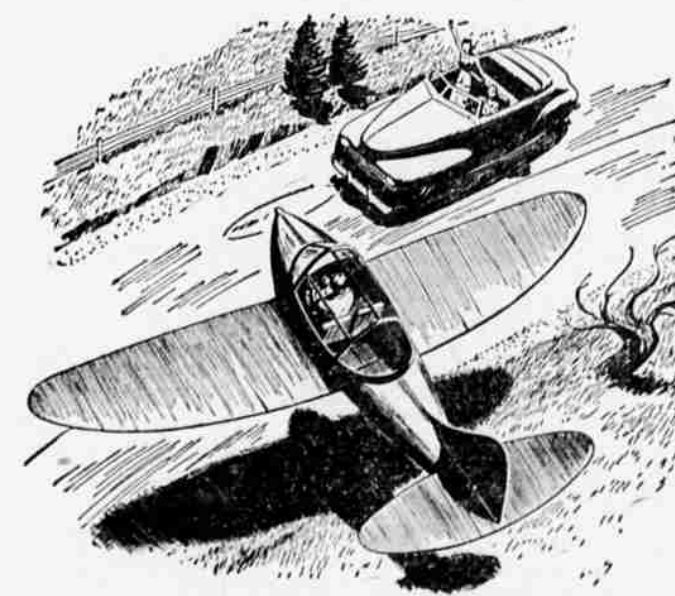
