

HEREFORD SHOW AND AUCTION TO ATTRACT FINEST

With work of the sifting committee finished and catalogs in the mails, details had shaped up early this month pointing to the annual Cal-Oregon Hereford association show and sale at Klamath Falls, on Oct. 28 and 29 as the outstanding event, from a quality standpoint, ever staged by this Pacific Slope breeders' organization, according to John Day, Medford, association president.

Some 100 bulls and 50 females, the pick of breeding stock from leading herds of the three coast states, are slated to be judged on Sunday, Oct. 28, by the internationally known beef cattle authority, Dr. W. L. Carlyle of Annadel Farms, Santa Rosa, Calif. On Oct. 29 these cattle will go through the auction ring, under the hammer of auctioneer Earl O. Walter of Elmer, Idaho.

Between these two events, the western brand of hospitality which has made Klamath Falls a popular rendezvous for cattlemen will hold sway, particularly at the annual cattlemen's dinner Sunday night in the Willard hotel, Day said.

This year arrangements for conducting the sale will be greatly improved by installation of a permanent public address system in the sale pavilion, the president announced. A call system will also be employed to notify consignors of the order of sale, thus helping bring each successive lot of cattle into ring promptly as their turns come.

"Both range operators and breeders have found the annual Cal-Oregon events to their liking. There has always been a good supply of big, heavy-boned, rugged range bulls, plus many choice foundation females and herd sire prospects," Day asserted. "This year this will be more true than ever, the sale committee promises. To aid the range man in securing bulls in numbers to meet his needs, it is announced that no choice of pen lots will be permitted this year. The entire pen is to sell at the same per-head price in every instance.

"Adding a great deal of zest this year to the Sunday showing of the cattle will be a total of \$1,200 in premium money, to be divided between first, second and third place winners in the classes shown. Of this amount, \$500 is coming from Klamath county, \$450 from the Cal-Oregon Association, and \$250 from the American Hereford association.

"Those planning to attend the Cal-Oregon show and sale are urged to get their reservations for hotel rooms in as early as possible, addressing Mitchell Tillotson, sales manager, at the First National Bank in Klamath Falls," Day concluded.

Camp White Men Don Winter O.D.

Camp White, Oct. 25—Marking the official beginning of fall and winter for the army, a memorandum issued from Camp White headquarters Wednesday morning authorized the wearing of the wool olive drab uniform only by men of the Camp White post. Since many of the men are scheduled for discharges before next spring, the order meant that Tuesday was the last day they wore their summer tans in the service.

T-4 BENJAMIN IS AWARDED SOLDIER MEDAL FOR FETE

T/4 Nicholas C. Benjamin, who took part of his military training at Camp White with the 96th division, has been awarded the soldier's medal for heroic action while on Leyte, according to a letter received by his wife, Mrs. Peggy Benjamin, 317 South Orange street. T/4 Benjamin is now en route home from duty in the Pacific.

The citation said: "Technician Fourth Grade Nicholas C. Benjamin, Field Artillery, United States Army. For heroism displayed at Philippine Islands on 22 Feb. 1945. Technician Fourth Grade Benjamin investigated a fire alarm at an ammunition dump, discovered a smoking 155mm phosphorous shell amidst a stack of similar ammunition. Knowing the hazards involved in such a task, he picked the shell up in his hands and attempted to carry it to a well approximately 50 yards away. Despite painful burns from the phosphorous, Technician Fourth Grade Benjamin, aided by another man, managed to deposit the sputtering projectile in the well and immediately sprayed it with a chemical fire extinguisher and filled the well with sand. Technician Fourth Grade Benjamin's quick-wittedness and heroic actions undoubtedly saved many lives and prevented the loss and destruction of a large stock of ammunition. His disregard for personal welfare and self sacrifice in his attempt to save his companions from danger reflects great credit upon himself and the military service."

T/4 Benjamin captured a Jap flag on Leyte on Nov. 7, 1944, the day his son, Nicholas Benjamin, II, was born. Mrs. Benjamin is the daughter of Grover Corum, 143 Kenwood street.
