

## NEVADA FUMBLES GIVE BEARS WIN

Berkeley, Cal., Oct. 27—(U.P.)—Two last-minute touchdowns broke a 6-6 deadlock and gave the University of California Bears a 19-6 victory over Nevada in a ruggedly-played grid encounter before 25,000 fans in Memorial stadium this afternoon.

Deadlocked six all after three quarters of play, the Bears took quick advantage of two fumbles midway in the final period to keep the Wolfpack backed against their own goal line and clinch the game.

## SPORTS BLACK TORNADO ROUTS CAVEMEN BY 73-0 SCORE

### Medford Runs Wild Over Helpless Grants Pass Eleven; Riggs' Ankle Hurt

Medford high's football machine rolled through a helpless Grants Pass aggregation to the tune of 73 to 0 at Grants Pass last night to chalk up Medford's sixth consecutive win this year and sixteenth in the past two years.

With four exceptions, Medford steam-rolled to a touchdown every time they got their hands on the ball. The Cavemen's deepest penetration into Medford territory came in the second period when they pushed the ball down to the Medford 37 yard line and lost it on a fumble.

**Greene Gets Fumble**  
Grants Pass took the opening kickoff and fumbled on the second play. Nick Greene recovering for Medford on the Caveman 28 yard stripe. Bob Watson, in three plays, crashed into the end zone and the rout was on. Grants Pass kicked on fourth down after running a Medford kickoff from the 15 yard line to the 23. Glenn Bostwick, Jerry Clark and Watson alternated to move the oval from their own 10 yard line to the Caveman 30 in four plays. Jerry Ross then tossed a pass to Bostwick which was good for a touchdown. Watson's conversion was good and Medford led 13-0 as the first quarter ended.

**Watson Again**  
On the third play of the second period Watson again scored—raced four yards out—and converted the extra point.  
Grants Pass took the kickoff on their own 10 yard marker and, with two running plays and a pass, moved it to the Medford 45. Another pass was intercepted by Jim Cave on his 39. He dashed back to the Caveman 40 where he was trapped. He lateraled to Bostwick and the fleet-footed left half-back raced the rest of the way for another score with Watson making the extra point. Some nice blocking paved the way for Bostwick's touchdown gallop.

**Riggs Injured**  
Captain Darrell Riggs, making a tackle on a right end run, and Jerry Hunter, on a nice pass from Earl Stelle, both accounted for touchdowns before the half ended to give Medford a 40-0 bulge.  
Don Waltron, who took the opening kickoff starting the second half picked up 12 yards before he was tackled and Medford was off for another score. Bostwick, off tackle, picked up 38 yards and four plays later Clark went over from the four yard line. The conversion attempt was good Grants Pass, after taking the kickoff, picked up their initial first down but was forced to kick. Bostwick took it on his own 30 and bulled

and sidestepped his way through the entire Caveman club for another touchdown. The conversion again was good.

**Pass Intercepted**  
Medford intercepted a Grants Pass aerial after the Cavemen tried a couple of plays and moved to the 11 yard line on four plays when Grants Pass intercepted from Ross. The Tornado quarterback evened it up a few plays later when he grabbed a Caveman pass attempt as the quarter ended with Medford out in front 54-0.

On the second play of the last quarter Stelle shot a beautiful pass to LeRoy House who went down to the 10 yard line and lateraled to Bill Singler. Singler was tackled on the six and Stelle went over on the next play. The conversion was again good.

Grants Pass kicked on third down and another pass from Stelle to House gathered up 18 yards and Carr picked up 44 more on a left end run. Singler found a hole between guard and tackle and made another touchdown, the conversion attempt failing.

**House Sets One Up**  
Medford's last touchdown of the game was set up by a beautiful 56 yard pass from Stelle to House with Stelle scoring on the next play on a quarterback sneak.

Lloyd Timmons intercepted a Caveman pass on his own 33 to put Medford in possession of the ball as the game ended.  
Medford made 26 first downs to four for the Cavemen in running their figure to 322 points to their opponents' seven.

## PENN BEATEN BY NAVY 14 TO 7 IN LAST 24 SECONDS

### Northwestern Downs Purdue, Ohio State Beats Gophers—Irish Roll On

New York, Oct. 27—(U.P.)—It was Navy day all over the land today but the fleet's premier football team didn't seem to realize it until the last 24 seconds of its thrill-packed game at Pennsylvania when a touchdown pass gave the Midshipmen a 14 to 7 victory.

That finish in the top football game of the day packed all the drama usually found in weeks of gridiron play. It came when Tony Minisi, a Pennsylvania star on the 1944 season, turned on his former mates by catching a touchdown pass from Hornschmeyer on a 23-yard play.

The play kept Navy's perfect record intact, but the Midshipmen lost a lot of prestige because Penn's highly-keyed youngsters outplayed them most of the way and kept them scoreless until the final period.

There were two startling developments in the midwest where Northwestern's Wildcats upset the Big Ten leaders, Purdue, 26 to 14, and Ohio State rebounded to spoil Minnesota's perfect record, 20 to 7.

In another midwestern highlight, Notre Dame's Ramblers kept their perfect record intact with a 56 to 0 drubbing of Iowa. Indiana won a hard intersectional battle with Tulsa's previously unbeaten Golden Hurricane, 7 to 0, Michigan downed Illinois, 19 to 0, Great Lakes Naval drubbed Western Michigan, 39 to 0 and Michigan State tied Marquette, 13 to 13.

In the east the Army's classy Cadets rolled to a 48 to 13 victory over Duke. Yale surprised Cornell, 18 to 7, Dartmouth battled to an 8 to 0 win, its first, over Syracuse. Temple topped Pittsburgh, 6 to 0. Holy Cross won 21 to 0 over Colgate, Harvard won from Coast Guard Academy, 25 to 0, Columbia drubbed Brown, 27 to 6, Bucknell upset Lafayette, 26 to 2, Princeton topped Rutgers, 14 to 6, and West Virginia tied Maryland, 13 to 13.

Alabama led the way in the Southland with a 28 to 14 win over Georgia Tech. Tulane drubbed Southern Methodist, 19 to 7, Tennessee topped Villanova, 33 to 2 and Arkansas beat Mississippi 19 to 0. Virginia defeated Virginia Tech, 31 to 13. Missouri and Oklahoma remained dominant in the Big Six. Missouri won from Nebraska, 19 to 0, and the Sooners defeated

Kansas State, 41 to 13. Kansas scored a 13 to 0 win over Wichita.

Rice knocked Texas out of the Southwest conference lead with a 7 to 6 upset while Texas A. & M. rolled to a 19 to 13 victory over Baylor. Oklahoma A. & M. was a 25 to 12 winner over Texas Christian.

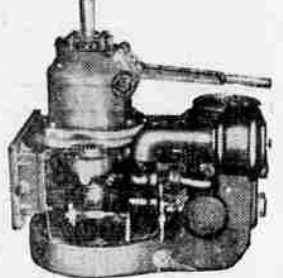
