MURMURS THAT DO NOT SIGNIFY

Through an odd combination of circumstances I knew as much when I was a sophomore in medical school as I'd ever know. The circumstances were (1) I had a brand new stethoscope, (2) Grandma O'M had but one lung left—on the basis of what she declared the great Dr. Shattuck of Boston had told her when she was a slip of a girl, and (3) I was stone deaf in one ear. So after a thorough listen with my fine new stethoscope I broke it gently to the other members of the family that I heard no breathing sounds at all. Grandma O'M was vindicated, after years of tush-tush. "There, now, I tell you, Eien, that boy knows as much now he he'll ever know!"

My difficulty was not that I had but one good ear—for with that ear, if there is reasonable quiet, I can hear rales and things which are hardly audible to ordinary ears—I mean my hearing in that one ear is better than the average hearing of people with two good ears—that is, always provided there are no confusing noises in the environment.

There are a good many poor geeks walking around, oh so carefully test they overexert themselves, under the morbid obsession that they have "heart trouble" when in fact they have nothing the matter with the heart or the circulation, except the disturbances of function arising from fear or anxiety arising from the suggestion or the bald assertion of some bumbling doctor that there is a "murmur" or that there is "a leaking valve" or that the heart is "weak" and the patient had better "take things easy" and be careful to avoid all strain.

Well, then, do I mean to say that a person can or should do nothing about it if his or her blood pressure is . . . ? No, I don't. But if you ask me about it honestly and not just to see whether you think I know what I'm talking about, I say, to wit as follows:
NEVER MIND YOUR BLOOD PRESSURE! IT'S NONE OF YOUR BUSINESS.
And don't let any one know I told you, but if I were you I would not put much faith in a doctor who mumbled or muttered about a murmur or about blood pressure if he did not explain exactly what he thinks about it or what to do about it.
