BURNING ALIVE OF FILIPINOS TOLD IN YAMASHITA TRIAL

Manila, Nov. 1—(U.P.)—Survivors told a military tribunal today that Japanese soldiers burned alive a former Filipino supreme court justice and 14 of his friends and repeatedly raped 40 of Manila's most beautiful

and socially-prominent women. The tribunal must decide whether Gen. Tomoyuki Yamashita, Japanese commander in the Philippines in 1944 and 1945, shall die for the mass rape, torture and murders committed by his forces during an eight-day reign of terror before the American liberation of Manila last February.

Mass Rape
Women and girls ravished as many as 15 times during that week of horror confronted Yamashita in the courtroom and told in all its revolting detail the story of their enforced shame. Press and public were barred from the session, but the digest

of the women's testimony was made available later. Testimony during the closed morning session revealed that the Japanese gathered 400 socially-prominent Manila residents in a public square Feb. 9 and separated the men from the women and girls. The Japanese then chose 20 "young, good-looking girls," took them to a cafe and piled

them with food and liquor, then assembled them on an upper floor of the swanky Bayview hotel.

Seven-Day Orgy
Japanese officers and enlisted men took their choice of the girls, forced them into single rooms and raped them. Many were virgins of only 12 or 14. The same procedure was fol-

lowed for the next six days at the Bayview hotel. Some women and girls were ravished in the main dining room in the presence of others detained by the Japanese.

EXTREMISTS CUT PALESTINE RAILS

Jerusalem, Nov. 1—(U.P.)—Jewish extremists cut Palestine railways at 50 places from Dan to Beersheba, wrecked trains and blew up police boats in a series of coordinated attacks last night and early today.

British authorities said casualties so far reported included four and perhaps five persons killed and eight wounded, one of them perhaps fatally.

The dead comprised one British soldier, one and possibly two policemen and two Palestinian railway crewmen. Another soldier, a policeman and six railway staffers were wounded.

Authorities said Jewish extremists have been looting quantities of explosives from army dumps and other stores for some time in preparation for just such a wave of terrorism in an attempt to force Britain to permit unlimited Jewish emigration to Palestine.

Los Angeles, Nov. 1—(U.P.)—Laura Zbriskie, 21, told Superior Judge Charles E. Hass today her ex-serviceman husband, Shirley Zbriskie, embarrassed her by leaving her and enrolling in the University of Southern California.

It was especially disturbing since she was a student at the University of California at Los Angeles.

Judge Hass sympathetically granted her a divorce on charges of extreme cruelty.

The two were married in Medford, Ore., May 23, 1943, and separated last August 9.

Mrs. Zbriskie is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. G. Gentner, 22 Groveland street, and was employed at Camp White at the time of her marriage.

AIR FORCE ENLISTED NEED ONLY 59 POINTS

Washington, Nov. 1—(U.P.)—Army Air Force enlisted men in the U. S. with 50 through 59 points and two years' service are eligible for discharge, it was announced today.

WACs service with the air force in this country, with 25 through 33 points and one year's service, also are eligible for discharge, the announcement said.

Fifty-pointers serving overseas will be eligible for discharge immediately upon their return to this country.

BARUCH WARNS AXIS WILL TRY COMEBACK

Washington, Nov. 1—(U.P.)—Bernard Baruch, elder statesman and adviser of presidents, warned his countrymen today that Germany and Japan "will strive unceasingly through science, technology, and engineering to devise some means for waging a third world war."

He declared that this country must remain constantly prepared—through universal military training and permanent scientific research—to stop aggression before it gets started.

15 GERMAN PWs KILLED ON RAILROAD CROSSING

Fl. Cluster, Mich., Nov. 1—(U.P.)—The toll of German prisoners of war killed when a New York Central passenger train plowed into their truck near Blissfield yesterday, remained at 15 today as Ft. Cluster authorities began an investigation of the accident.

The truck was returning the prisoners to the stockade at Adrian after a day of harvesting beets.

San Francisco, Nov. 1—(U.P.)—Eighteen vessels, including three held off the northern California coast by storms, were due to arrive here with 18,838 incoming Pacific veterans and liberated prisoners.

How to master the art of coffee making

Making a cup of good coffee is really an art, but a simple art, in which anyone can become adept. There are about five rules that have become second nature to me in brewing coffee at home. Perhaps it's their very simplicity that spells success... what would you say?

1. First and foremost, I select the proper grind for the type of coffee maker I expect to use in brewing the coffee. This, of course, eliminates my having to have vacuum-packed coffee reground. It has been my experience that having already-ground coffee put through the grinder a second time too often results in loss of flavor and aroma of the coffee. And the brew made from twice-ground coffee is usually cloudy and bitter. (NOTE: Many of you, I know, prefer whole-bean coffee which is ground right at the grocers at the time of purchase. A delicious brew can be obtained by this method if you remember that just one grinding is sufficient.)
2. I MEASURE both coffee and freshly boiling water accurately. I know it is important to use the same exact proportions every time coffee is made to be sure it will always taste the same. A good rule of thumb for coffee that is rich in flavor, as well as strength, is one heaping tablespoon (or two level tablespoons) of coffee to each 6-oz. cup, or 3/4 standard measuring cup, of freshly boiling water.
3. I TIME my coffee-making carefully. The coffee should be in contact with the water for a definite length of time, depending on the type and capacity of your coffee-maker, as well as the strength of beverage desired.
4. I make it a point to SERVE coffee SOON after it is made. Cool coffee cannot be reheated without injuring its flavor.
5. I CLEAN the coffee-maker daily, and at least twice a month give it a baking soda bath to keep it "sweet."
