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OCTOBER SLIGHTLY DRIER, WARMER

October of this year proved to be slightly drier and warmer than average according to the monthly meteorological summary of the local United States weather bureau. Highest temperature for the month was 93 degrees, which occurred on the 1st and 6th. Lowest temperature of 27 degrees occurred Oct. 24 and 25 with a killing frost Oct. 23. Mean temperature for the month was 56.6 degrees, compared with a normal average of 53.6 degrees, making an average daily departure of 3 degrees.

The month was unsettled with 15 cloudy days, six partly cloudy and 10 days that were clear. Measurable precipitation totaling 1.26 inches fell during nine days, leaving a deficiency for the month of 1.15 inches. A thunderstorm occurred October 9, and fog was noted on seven days during the month.

Prevailing wind was southerly, normal being northwesterly.

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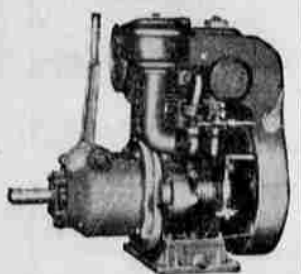
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
