

### RUSSIA REMAINS ALOOF FROM FAR EAST MEETINGS

Washington, Nov. 6—(U.P.)—The Far Eastern Advisory commission met for two hours today on "strictly organizational matters" and prepared to proceed with its work without a Russian representative.

The commission scheduled another meeting tomorrow to hear a report by Maj. Gen. J. H. Hilldring, head of the war department civil affairs division. He will tell the commission what has been happening in Japan under Gen. Douglas MacArthur's orders and directives.

The meeting was closed to the press but a spokesman revealed that there was no formal mention of Soviet Russia's absence except general statements by

some of the members that things would work out so that Russia eventually would be present.

**No Word Received**  
The spokesman said there has been no communication from Russia since the decision of the other big powers to revise the functions and scope of the commission to satisfy Soviet demands for a larger voice in the control machinery of Japan.

The commission met for the first time a week ago and recessed immediately until today to give the Russians a chance to send a representative in the light of new suggestions for "the terms of reference" of the commission.

### FBI WILL HOLD LAW CONFERENCE HERE TOMORROW

Federal bureau of investigation has scheduled a semi-annual FBI law enforcement conference at the Jackson county courthouse at 7 p. m. tomorrow.

Joseph E. Thornton, special agent in charge, will lead the conference and will speak particularly on the post-war crime outlook and also on the Unlawful Flight to Avoid Prosecution statute.



Two FBI agents are scheduled to talk at the conference, Ralph C. Vogel talking on the "Detection of Deception," and Howard B. Patterson on the subject of "Auto Thefts" and "Hit and Run Drivers," with particular emphasis on the use of laboratory aids in connection with investigations.

Florey, new chairman of the nurse's aid committee, "as no nurses have returned from the armed services to supplement depleted hospital staffs, we urgently request all accredited nurses' aids to call Mrs. C. W. Gutches, 3612."

An invitation is extended to all volunteer aids in Medford who are not affiliated in the corps, and all present members active or inactive to be present. Mrs. Gutches will arrange transportation.

### MERRILL GUILTY OF JAIL BREAK CHARGE

Robert Ben Merrill entered a plea of guilty to jail break and a plea of not guilty to assault and robbery indictments when arraigned today before Circuit Judge H. K. Hanna. Trial of the assault and robbery charge will start Tuesday, November 13, when the petit jury has been directed to report.

Merrill escaped from the county jail last August and was recaptured in Los Angeles a few weeks later. At the time of his escape he was being held on the robbery charge. He is represented by Attorney George A. Coding.

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### DONALD L. ELDER KILLED IN WRECK WHILE OVERSEAS

Word was received here recently of the death of Cpl. Donald L. Elder of the 66th armored regiment, which occurred in Marberg, Germany, Sept. 25. Cpl. Elder, 21, was in the service three and one-half years having served 11 months overseas. He was killed when a jeep in which he was riding with another soldier left a slippery road and struck a tree, according to word received by his mother, Mrs. Claude Payton, Morrow Road, from the war department.

Cpl. Elder, who graduated from Prospect high school in 1941 and was employed by Snider's Dairy and Produce company before entering the service, took his basic training at Camp Chaffey, Ark., and Fort Knox, Ky.

Besides his mother, he is survived by his grandmother, Mrs. Clara E. Phipps, of Morrow Road, Medford, and his father, A. J. Elder, Prospect.
