

D.A.V. WILL SELL FORGET-ME-NOTS FRIDAY, SATURDAY

Blue forget-me-nots, flowers of remembrance, will be sold in Jackson county Nov. 9 and 10 by Jackson county chapter, Disabled American Veterans, in an annual drive for funds for the rehabilitation of disabled veterans of World War I and World War II.

Plans for the flower sale were announced today by John Meals, D.A.V. chapter commander. Headquarters for the drive will be the Allen hotel from which a force of volunteer sales-girls

will canvass the city. "The entire proceeds from our annual 'Forget-Me-Not Sale,'" Commander John Meals said, "will be used for the chapter rehabilitation program. To further rehabilitation of disabled veterans the service officer of the D.A.V. offers free assistance in obtaining claims."

"The D.A.V. is incorporated by an act of congress as the official voice of all men and women disabled in defense of the nation. With casualties of World War II already exceeding those of World War I the work of the D.A.V. with the returning soldier becomes increasingly important."

The D.A.V. commander said the "Forget-me-not drive has been endorsed by President Truman who said 'I sincerely hope that the drive will be attended by every possible success.'"

"I urge the support of every resident of this community," Commander Meals said, "in the continuance of our program on behalf of the war's disabled. The marching years, carrying pain and suffering have passed slowly for these men whose help we needed and who today need ours."

Wife-Beater Gets Seven Hard Lashes Across Bare Back

Weiland, Ont., Nov. 6.—(U.P.)—A husky county jail guard dealt seven lashes with a strap today across the bare back of Frederick Randall, 19, a convicted wife-beater.

Randall made no outcry. Police Magistrate John B. Hopkins ordered the whipping after finding Randall guilty of beating and choking his wife, Evelyn, 17. Randall was not required to serve out the remainder of a 10-day jail sentence.

Randall's wife, her face bruised, charged in court that her husband "beat me and choked me so I couldn't cry out." A policeman testified that she said Randall had beaten her five times previously.

The couple have a child six months old.

Japs Deny Soldier Rode Hirohito Nag

Tokyo, Nov. 6.—(U.P.)—The Japanese imperial household denied today that an American soldier rode Emperor Hirohito's "famous white stallion" and would ride him again in a big GI rodeo next Sunday.

The Pacific Stars and Stripes reported today that Lt. Dick Ryan of Los Angeles, producer of the rodeo, had ridden the imperial mount "Hatsushimo or White Frost."

The story caused a minor sensation among incredulous Japanese.

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THREE KILLED ON K. F. RAIL CROSSING

Klamath Falls, Ore., Nov. 6.—(U.P.)—Authorities today were investigating the deaths of three persons in a freak automobile-train crash at a railroad crossing five miles south of here.

The dead were Dewey Tuttle, 32; his wife, Frances, 25, and Lucille Bishop, 21, of Sacramento, Cal., all potato harvest workers. They were killed late Saturday when the automobile they were passengers in crashed into a standing freight train on an Oregon-California and Eastern railroad cross.

The driver of the car, Donald R. Green of Fayette, Mich., suffered bruises and cuts.

Klamath Marines Get Candles Here For Anniversary

Because Klamath Falls stores had no birthday candles, Medford Red Cross workers today shopped for 170 candles to go on a huge Marine corps birthday cake for a celebration being planned by men of the Marine barracks there. Serving of the huge cake will be part of the 170th anniversary celebration there Saturday, Nov. 10, to which the general public is invited.

Early this morning Walter Bird, field director at Klamath Falls, called Red Cross officials here to ask if they could supply the candles. White was requested, but a worker for the camp and hospital council was unable to find enough of that color and substituted red and blue for the remainder.

Deschutes Lands To Be Set Aside For Recreation

Washington, Nov. 6.—(U.P.)—The house today passed a bill setting aside certain lands in the Deschutes national forest in Oregon as recreation areas and excluding them from federal laws to safeguard U. S. mining resources.

Secretary of Interior Harold L. Ickes told the house public lands committee that withdrawal of the land, a potential source of pumice, was not contrary to public interest.

"The lands have a present value for recreational purposes and there is no information that the pumice deposits . . . are now being developed commercially or that they will be in the reasonably near future," Ickes said.

The areas involved include East Lake and Pauline Lake, fishing waters visited annually by 20,000 persons, according to the committee report.

Ghoulis Lunatic Cuts Heart From New-Buried Body

Camden, N. J., Nov. 6.—(U.P.)—Police hunted today for a "ghoulis lunatic" who broke through a fresh grave to cut out the heart of a newly-buried body.

Camden County Coroner Joseph L. Myrtetus, who buried Mrs. Marion Stockman, 54, Friday, said that the woman's heart had been cut from her body. He said that other bodies in Calvary cemetery may have been violated, but the graves had been re-filled in time to escape discovery.

"This time," Myrtetus said, "the ghoulish lunatic apparently was frightened before he could refill the grave and he must have run away with the heart clutched in his hand."

Sgt. Archie Harris Passes in Service

Sgt. Archie O. Harris of Medford has died following service in the European war theater according to a release from the War department. The young man's wife, Eleanor J. Harris, resides at 1114 North Central avenue, and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. O. W. Harris, at Route 1, box 542-A.

Harris, who had been in the army reserve from 1939 to 1941, was inducted into the regular army in August of 1943. He was employed by the army engineers at Camp White at the time of his induction. The sergeant would have been 25 years of age next month.
