Armistice Day

Like Banquo's ghost, Armistice Day returns once more to remind us of the lasting peace and great good that might have come to this war-tired globe if the high expectations and hopes of 1918 had been realized.

HOW badly civilization missed the boat in the ensuing years is now a bitter chapter in history. The League of Nations, thought to be a panacea for the world's recurring relapses, was cast aside.

Covenants were made without confidence, treaties signed without sincerity. Power, politics, secret alliances, double talk and double dealings, hypocrisy, selfishness, intolerance, and fear—all those stepping stones to inevitable conflict and catastrophe were there.

TODAY we honor the men of two generations who have fought valiantly and died nobly to pave the way to a future we must now build. Again, after a terrible ordeal, the nations of the world look about in bewilderment.

WE had better get on with that job. America must assume moral leadership and steer other nations on a course of international cooperation before it is too late.

That enduring peace will not be easily achieved is pretty well accepted today. The illusions of 1918 have long since been dispelled—and that is heartening. We face the problems of peace as realists.

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LT. HUNT HONORED POSTHUMOUSLY IN AWARD OF MEDAL



His husband and son of Mrs. Cecil Hunt both are casualties of the war. At the left is her husband, Capt. Cecil Hunt, who lost his life when a B-17 in which he was flying exploded in midair, and at the right is her son, Lt. Cecil Hunt, Jr., who has just been posthumously awarded the silver star.

Mrs. Cecil Hunt, formerly of Medford, who now resides at the La Ronda Apartments, Santa Barbara, Calif., has been informed by Maj. Gen. Edward Witschel that the silver star has been awarded posthumously to her son, Lt. Cecil Hunt, Jr., who was killed by shrapnel in action in Europe Jan. 1, 1945.

On April 2, 1944, her husband, Capt. Cecil Hunt, was killed with three others when their B-17 exploded in the air near Granada, Miss. Lt. Hunt, who was 23 when he was killed, entered the service on April 21, 1942, and went overseas in July, 1944. He was a graduate of Hill Military Academy in Portland, Ore., and was in his last year at the University of Oregon where he was a member of Sigma Alpha Epsilon when he went into the army.

For gallantry in action against the enemy in Eastern—on December 19, 1944: Lt. Hunt was given the hazardous mission of reconnoitering the area around Fort — and cutting its protective wiring. In addition to the successful accomplishment of his mission, Lt. Hunt proceeded to the fort and climbed upon it, making a close study of the turrets and the type of weapons likely to be encountered. The information proved to be invaluable.

"Lt. Hunt's intrepidity, initiative, thoroughness and superb devotion to duty are in keeping with the finest traditions of our armed forces."
