## INFLATION HAS POLITICAL BASE SAYS RUKEYSER

Merryle Stanley Rukeyser, New York economist and author, who will address the Rogue River Valley Knife and Fork club November 16 at Roosevelt school, today denied that wartime inflation is inevitable. He declared that inflation results from a tendency of politicians to



pursue the easiest way, rather than to face the realities boldly. Mr. Rukeyser, author of the much-discussed book entitled "Financial Security in a Changing World" and of a daily syndicated economic column, pointed out that inflation enables timid politicians for a time run in opposite directions at the same time. Thus it is a tool for propitiating pressure groups at the expense of piling up an immense deferred cost which all citizens ultimately have to bear. "There is increasing talk," Mr. Rukeyser said, "of controlling inflation. The problem is not baffling when expressed in theoretical terms, but the difficulty lies in the political sphere. "For the blunt truth is that that generally denounced phenomenon, namely, inflation, does temporarily at least serve political ends."

**50 Servicemen To Get Acre of Land**  
Sunbury, Pa. (UP)—At least one local business man thinks the Civil War promise of "40 acres and a mule" wasn't such a bad idea. Because of a scarcity of mules, however, the unidentified philanthropist can't exactly repeat the old offer. But he has advertised that he will give 50 servicemen an acre of land each. Veterans must prove they are "married and reliable" and agree to build homes on the land.
