

CEILINGS ON PORK STAY UP DESPITE RAIL RATE SLASH

Washington, Nov. 14—(U.P.)—Present ceiling prices on pork products, including lard, will not be lowered despite reductions in freight rates to the west coast, the office of price administration announced today.

The interstate commerce commission has authorized substantial reductions in freight rates on packinghouse products moving westward from the central part of the country.

The OPA said there were two reasons why there would be no reductions in ceiling prices of pork at this time:

1—Lower ceilings to the western states would make it necessary to reduce live hog prices, which would not be consistent with the present shortage of hogs.

CIO ASKS PERMIT FOR 6 FM RADIOS

Washington, Nov. 14—(U.P.)—The United Automobile Workers (CIO) has applied to the federal communications commission for licenses to operate FM radio stations in six cities, UAW President R. J. Thomas disclosed today.

Thomas said that if the applications were approved, the stations would be operated jointly by the international executive board and local unions in Cleveland, Detroit, Chicago, Los Angeles, Flint, Mich., and Newark, N. J.

He said the union had decided to apply for licenses to operate its own FM stations because "we now have no medium of public expression of our own since we have no newspapers."

Thomas said the proposed stations would be operated as non-profit enterprises. Only sufficient commercial time to pay actual operating costs would be sold, he said. The remainder of the time would be devoted to public interest and labor programs.

The chain would cost about \$400,000, he said, and \$160,900 for anticipated deficits during the first year of operation.

Miss Dorothea Moore and Harold Bishop, state supervisors of health and physical education from the state department of education, will be in Medford Thursday and Friday to meet with teachers concerned with health and physical education and to give information regarding the health and physical education law passed by the state legislature at its last session.

C. R. Bowman, superintendent of county schools, states that arrangements have been made for the two supervisors to conduct workshops at the Medford senior high school gymnasium, sessions on Thursday to be for high school teachers and those on Friday for grade school instructors. Since in many small schools all teachers must supervise physical education and health classes, some schools are closing in order that teachers may attend, Bowman states.

The workshop will include practical demonstrations of physical education activities in which the pupils of Medford city schools will participate.

Armored—8th "Super Sixth" division; 7th "Lucky Seventh" division; 9th "Phantom" division; 10th "Tiger" division; 11th "Thunderbolt" division; 14th division; 16th division.
