Frederick William Gray, a resident of Medford for the past 35 years, passed away at his home, 507 Palm street Tuesday. He had been in failing health for some time.

Mr. Gray was in business here 30 years ago and was co-owner in the department store of Gray and Moe. Prior to that he operated a general merchandise business in Ponca, Okla. Failing health caused him to retire from business many years ago.

He was born at Owen Sound, Canada, and came to the states with his parents when one year old. Mr. Gray was a loyal member of the First Christian church of Medford and for many years served as deacon.

Besides his wife, Pearl N. Gray, he leaves one son and two daughters, LeRoy E. Gray of Evanston, Ill.; Mrs. Clarence Keizer and Mrs. Henry Niedermeyer both of Medford. Also one grandchild, Evelyn Carroll Niedermeyer. A sister, Florence Lewis, resides in Michigan and a brother, A. E. Gray in Oklahoma.

ROY G. SMITH NEW WATER DIRECTOR

Roy G. Smith was elected a director of the Medford Irrigation District from Division No. 3, succeeding George B. Dean, in the annual election held Tuesday at Oakgrove school. Smith, well-known orchard owner living near Jacksonville, has resided in the county for some 30 years and has operated the orchard for about 15 years.

George B. Dean, retiring director, was elected in 1939 and has been active in the district's affairs. J. M. Spencer, manager of the district, pointed out today that Dean has always advocated consistent and business like improvement of the system. "During his two terms in office the bonded debt has been materially reduced and even during the war years, with lack of material and men, the system was maintained and steadily improved," Spencer declared. "The board is proud of the fact that the equipment of the district was in such good order at the beginning of the war that little or no priorities for equipment and replacements have been needed."

Honolulu, Nov. 14.—(U.P.)—Police today toured the wrecked Damon tract district in a house to house search for "gook" hoodlums involved in Monday night's mass riots between the navy and civilians.

Armed shore patrolmen and police patrolling the area reported all quiet with all navy enlisted men of the Honolulu air station restricted to their base and the zoo-suited teen-aged gooks in hiding.

A two-way investigation of the rioting in which a mob of sailors and at least two officers were involved was under way by the navy and the Honolulu police.
