ARTIFICIAL LIMB MAKERS CHARGED WITH CONSPIRACY

Washington, Nov. 15—(U.P.)—Widespread conspiracy among artificial limb manufacturers to fix "high, artificial and unreasonable prices" was charged in an indictment returned today by a federal grand jury here.

The indictment charged that unlawful price-fixing hampered veterans administration in providing veterans with artificial limbs.

The indictment, charging violation of the anti-trust law, named a trade association, 45 corporations and 34 individuals who manufacture approximately 75 per cent of the limbs and 90 per cent of the parts and accessories used in this country's \$10,000,000-a-year artificial limb business.

Attorney General Tom C. Clark, who announced the indictment, said the effect of the alleged conspiracy was "to deprive the U. S. Veterans Administration of the opportunity to make artificial limbs for war veterans and to force the Veterans Administration, as well as various state agencies, to pay non-competitive prices for artificial limbs."
