

COMPETITION TO FORCE BIG OUTLAY BY U.S. RAILROADS

Systems Prepared to Make Vast Improvements Pullman Vice President Says

San Francisco, Nov. 15—(AP) American railroads, boasting that current assets exceed liabilities by \$175,000,000, are prepared to make vast improvements to meet competition of airlines and bus systems, Stephen Early, former White House secretary, said today.

Speaking at a San Francisco advertising club luncheon, Early visualized huge shipments of supplies to China, Asia and the Philippines through Pacific coast ports. Early is vice president of Pullman, Inc., of Chicago.

Frisco Main Gate
"In the post war decade, as the nation's great gateway to the Pacific, you will have important responsibilities," Early told San Franciscans.

"China has indicated to our government that to rehabilitate the war ravaged areas and to take care of other immediate requirements it must have shipments and credits amounting to \$350,000,000. On top of that its long delayed program of industrial modernization will spend almost another billion.

Railroads will take an important part in transporting materials and personnel to the Pacific coast for dispatch to the Orient, Early said.

Innovations Noted
In pointing out that railroads expect to compete with airlines and bus routes, Early described the many innovations in dining, recreation cars and coaches.

"Some observers may get a distorted picture of what the prospects are for rail passenger traffic in these post war years because of the almost fabulous predictions being broadcast regarding aviation," Early continued.

"Yet, as we have seen in the past, rapid strides in one branch of transportation do not necessarily mean a decline in business for another," he added.

GLYCERINE LACK MAY SLOW PEACE TIME PRODUCTION

Washington — National supplies of glycerine are the lowest in years, and this lack of glycerine may slow down production of peacetime goods, according to the bureau of agricultural economics, department of agriculture, which points out that there isn't much chance for improvement in the fats and oils import picture for many months to come.

Glycerine, a by-product of soap making, was in short supply at the beginning of the war, and needed in tremendous quantities for ammunition, dynamite, explosives and medicines. Gradually, however, through making of soap and other war-time supplies for the army and navy, lend-lease, etc., the glycerine stockpile grew to huge proportions.

Now, due to shortages of industrial fats and oils, the glycerine situation again is acute, according to BAE.

All of which adds up to another reason for saving used cooking fat, department of agriculture officials say. Fats and oils, glycerine and other by-products which come from them, go into practically everything that is manufactured. To help turn out household and personal needs that the American people have gone without during the years of war, we must have more industrial fats and oils.

Soap chips, laundry soap, toilet soap, nylon stockings, paper

nappkins, cotton sheets, refrigerators, electric fans, paint, pharmaceuticals, tires, linoleum, elastic stretch girdles, paper, oil-cloth, plumbing fixtures are just a few of the products requiring industrial fats and oils in their manufacture.

Cannot Import Oils
Despite the end of the war, fats and oils cannot be imported from the islands of the south Pacific until plants are reconstructed, workers recruited, and shipping available to bring the processed oil back to this country.

Now that meat is more plentiful, women are urged to intensify their used fat salvage—scrape skillets, render table scraps and raw fat cut from meat before cooking, skim soups and water in which frankfurters have been cooked. Every drop counts now, and every pound is worth four cents and four points when turned over to the meat dealer.

How to enhance your holiday baking

ORANGE OR LEMON PASTRY
To your standard pastry recipe add 1 to 1½ table-spoons of grated orange or lemon rind to the flour and shortening mixture. (Part orange or lemon juice may be used for the liquid.)

Or you might like a change from Pumpkin Pie to Sweet Potato Pie. Here is my favorite recipe:

SWEET POTATO PIE

2 cups mashed sweet potatoes
3 eggs
1 cup sugar
1 tsp. mace
½ tsp. salt
1½ cups milk

½ cup orange juice
1 tbsp. lemon juice
2 tbsps. grated orange rind
½ cup melted butter
Unbaked pastry shell
6 tbsps. sugar

Boil potatoes in jackets, peel, mash and measure. Separate eggs, beat yolks until light; add sugar mixed with mace and salt. Combine with sweet potatoes; add milk, orange juice, lemon juice, orange rind and butter. Place in unbaked pie shell. Bake in hot oven (450° F.) for 15 minutes; reduce to moderate oven (350° F.) and bake 45 minutes longer. Make meringue with egg whites and 6 tbsps. sugar. Spread roughly on top of pie; return to oven; bake in moderate oven (350° F.) 15 minutes. Makes 1 9-inch pie.

Or what about a simple pudding—one that has sheer elegance of flavor! Serve your favorite sauce with:

QUEEN'S TASTE PUDDING

1½ cups flour
2½ tbsps. baking powder
¼ tsp. salt
1 cup sugar
¾ cup milk
½ cup softened shortening

1 egg
1 tsp. vanilla extract
½ cup sliced maraschino cherries
½ cup chopped nuts

Sift and measure flour; sift with baking powder, salt and sugar into large bowl. Measure milk into cup and add enough shortening to bring it to the 1-cup mark. Pour milk and shortening into bowl containing the flour; add unbeaten egg and flavoring. Beat with rotary beater for 1 minute, or until batter is smooth. Add cherries and nuts; mix. Pour into well-greased cake pan (8 x 8 x 2). Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) 25 minutes, or until done. Serve hot with your favorite sauce. Serves 8 to 10
