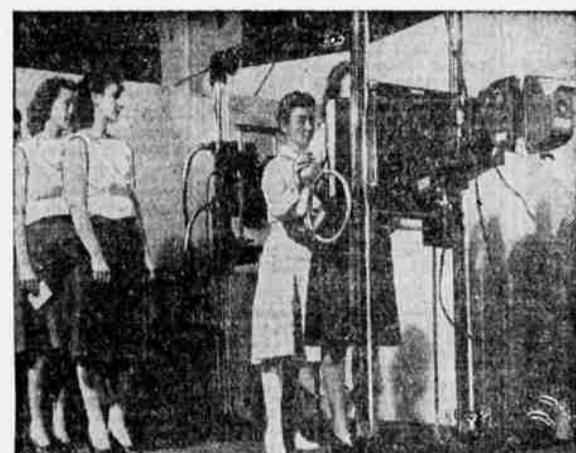

Why Not Have Your Picture Taken?

FREE chest X-rays will be made available to you and other people of this county Nov. 27 to Dec. 6. This free, voluntary and confidential offer is made possible by the Jackson County Public Health Association with the use of the Oregon Tuberculosis Association's Chest X-ray Survey Unit.

AFTER you are X-rayed, a card or letter is sent to you AT YOUR HOME, informing you of the result of the findings. Only the person X-rayed is given this information.

HAVING a chest X-ray is safe and harmless. It takes only a half minute to take the picture. The Chest X-ray Survey Unit has private dressing compartments; capes are provided for women who have the pictures taken.

If you wish to take advantage of this opportunity of having your chest X-rayed, sign your name on the attached form. Leave it at the Chamber of Commerce, the Health Department in the Courthouse, or mail to Mrs. Dwight Findley, P. O. Box 169, Medford, Oregon.

I would like to have a chest X-ray when the Chest X-ray Survey Unit comes to this community, as my part in the community project of finding unknown cases of tuberculosis.
