**MARINES ASSIST NATIONALISTS IN CHINA FIGHTING**

**Americans in Fierce Battle Against Communists On Peiping-Chinwangtao.**

Chungking, Nov. 23—(U.P.)—The communist newspaper New China Daily asserted today that Chinese nationalist troops assisted by U. S. marines were engaged in fierce fighting against communists on the Peiping-Chinwangtao railroad south of China's great wall.

The newspaper said the central government forces had occupied the town of Liu Shou-Ying, 25 miles south of Chinwangtao where American ships landed central government troops advancing against Juliao in Manchuria, has been under communist harassing attack for some time. Last week communists fired on a troop train carrying marines from Peiping to Chinwangtao.

New China Daily said that the alleged American aid was given to central government troops in China's northeastern Hopei district. Fighting raged in the Fengyuen and Luanshsien sectors, 30 miles south of Liu Shou-Ying, the newspaper said.

**Near Hulutao**  
Government sources meanwhile reported that nationalists were approaching Hulutao, important Manchurian port, following the capture of Lienshan, a rail junction 10 miles to the west.

No word of the asserted direct American aid to central forces along the railroad came from U. S. forces in China.

**AMERICANS KILLED IN INDIAN RIOTING**

Calcutta, Nov. 23—(U.P.)—A major and three other U. S. army men were killed and several other Americans injured during the night in rioting by Indian mobs, which boosted overall casualties today to at least 18 dead

and 125 wounded.

Violence mounted today as unruly thousands of Indians ranged the streets of Calcutta, attacking American and British military vehicles and skirmishing with any who blocked their way.

A mob attacked the American officers' club late last night, when U. S. army men were holding a Thanksgiving day dance. A bloody battle was fought, with the Indians hurling bricks

and grappling with the Americans, who defended themselves.
