**MALNUTRITION**  
Malnutrition is a far more common condition than is generally suspected. Its results are much farther reaching than is usually realized even by physicians. The Richards Institute of the Pennsylvania State College made a study covering 2511 adults and children. The survey covered a period of six years. It is said to be one of the most thorough ever made. The conclusion is that only one person in a thousand escapes malnutrition. Only eight were free of tooth decay. The weight of 17% was under par. Sixty percent of the children were more than six months retarded in skeletal growth. In fact the bones of a large majority of both adults and children were not properly mineralized. Such bone defects are linked with deficiencies in proteins, calcium, phosphorus, and vitamin D in particular. The study of nutrition is one of the important subjects of naturopathy.


