

## COURTS MARTIAL TOO SEVERE IS MORSE'S BELIEF

Washington, Nov. 27—(U.P.)—Sen. Wayne Morse, R., Ore., today introduced a resolution calling for senate investigation of army and navy court martial systems.

Morse's resolution asked that a nine-member committee investigate alleged miscarriages of justice, whether punishment is unduly severe, lack of uniformity in sentences, and whether present court martial procedure is proper and just.

Morse said the inquiry should

extend to the prisons, jails and other places in which service personnel are confined.

The committee would be composed of three members from the naval affairs committee, three from the military affairs committee, and three from the judiciary committee.

Sen. William F. Knowland, R., Calif., himself an ex-serviceman, vigorously supported the resolution. He said soldiers still are receiving court martial sentences on the basis of wartime conditions.

### OAKLAND HAS FIRE

Oakland, Cal., Nov. 27—(U.P.)—A three-alarm fire, believed started by spontaneous combustion in a cereal bin at the Keystone Products Co., today caused \$25,000 damage to the company's building and stored grain products. Seven companies of Oakland firemen answered the alarm, which was turned in by the crew of a Southern Pacific switch engine.

## YANK EQUIPMENT WORTH MILLIONS BEING DESTROYED

### Australians Say Army Burning, Burying, Casting Into Sea Food and Machinery.

San Francisco, Nov. 27—(U.P.)—The U. S. army is burning and destroying \$3,250,000 worth of equipment, including canned foods, radios, medical equipment and typewriters, in the Finschaven area of New Guinea, and similar destruction is taking place on islands north of Australia, Melbourne radio reported today.

Quoting a correspondent of the Melbourne Herald, the broadcast said that "American army men are burning and bulldozing in the earth everything they can not sell or get rid of on the spot."

### Tossed Into Sea

Melbourne said that radio transmitters, receivers, jeep motors, generators, hospital gear, vehicles and typewriters are being tossed into the sea or plowed underground. "Huge quantities" of food also are being destroyed, said a broadcast, heard by United Press.

"Appalled by the thoroughness with which Americans are carrying out the order (to destroy), Australians have been intercepting full trucks and persuading drivers to transfer loads to them," Melbourne said. "Many drivers equally keen to avoid wanton waste are handing over tinned turkeys and vegetables and other delicacies."

"Australians too are getting rich hauls from salvage dumps awaiting disposal by fire or bulldozer."

Many Australians, the broadcast continued, have recovered "first-class" radio receivers. One Australian acquired tape measures worth \$3,250 and others obtained "costly" medical equipment.

### Typewriters Cheap

"Typewriters have been pick-

ed up for a bottle or two of gin," Melbourne said.

Two missionaries who have been granted permission to spend \$100,000 on buildings and hospital equipment to establish a mission are standing helplessly by "while timber and flooring dissolve into smoke, equipment is burned, buried or dumped into the sea and food is wasted," the broadcast added.

The missionaries could buy the American goods at 10 per cent of cost, Melbourne explained, but they have no place to store or guard it.

### NEW DRIVE FOR BOOST IN CONGRESSMEN'S PAY

Washington, Nov. 27—(U.P.)—A fresh drive was under way today to give each congressman a \$5,000-a-year pay raise.

Sen. Sheridan Downey, D., set it off with an admission that it was "embarrassing" for congressmen to be thinking about boosting their own salaries.

But declaring firmly that there was "no escape from such duty," Downey wrote to every senator seeking support for a proposal to raise congressional salaries from the present \$10,000 to \$15,000 a year.

## NEW REGULATIONS ADDED TO STATE HEALTH PROGRAM

A number of new rules and regulations affecting the state's health program were adopted at the last meeting of the State Board of Health held in Portland according to a news release from the board. At this meeting Dr. L. D. Inskip, Medford, was named vice-president of the board.

The board adopted new communicable disease rules and regulations, approved a pocket-size birth registration card, mapped a program of blood plasma distribution, drafted plans for board employee health examinations and considered the question of new offices.

Revision of communicable disease rules makes certain new diseases reportable, including rheumatic fever and infectious hepatitis and removed from the list certain minor conditions. Recommended changes in quarantine requirements were adopted and the board removed provisions for placarding chickenpox, measles, whooping cough, glanders, tularemia, epidemic encephalitis and scarlet fever. Strict isolation only is to be maintained in control of these diseases.

The board voted new rules concerning isolation and quarantine of infectious tuberculosis and also placarding of typhoid fever and strict control of chronic carriers.

Modifying the vital statistics rules and regulations, the board acted to make the new birth registration card available to applicants with birth certificates on file in Oregon. The card is provided with plastic case and is issued for a 50-cent fee. The dried blood plasma distribution will be for benefit of needy persons from a supply made available by the Office of Civilian Defense.
