

## PUBLIC JAMMING NATION'S STORES IN GIFT SPLURGE

22 More Shopping Days Before Christmas; People Buying Anything Offered

There are only 22 more shopping days until Christmas, but the buying public doesn't seem to mind.

Ready to splurge wartime earnings on their first peacetime Christmas in four years, shoppers began jamming the nation's stores two weeks ago.

**Buy Anything**  
One merchant described it as "a regular frenzy—they're buying anything they can lay their hands on."

The day after Thanksgiving marked the official opening of the shopping season. But on Chicago's State street the Christmas decorations, including a mammoth chimney and a fireplace large enough to accommodate a street car in the hearth, went up Nov. 10.

A Madison, Wis., department store head said customers started laying away Christmas gifts last August. Christmas merchandise began to move in Omaha about the middle of October. And an Indianapolis merchant said "It's been Christmas here all year."

Most cities reported that the dollar volume of sales was five to 20 per cent higher than last year.

"The volume of business is almost unbelievable," a Denver store manager said. He predicted a shortage in all stocks "long before Christmas."

**More Gifts Offered**  
But a United Press survey indicated that supplies of most gift items are larger than last year. The chief shortages are in household goods, sports equipment and certain types of clothing.

At one Chicago department store women bought aluminum pots and pans straight from the hand trucks before saleswomen could get them onto the shelves. A shipment of 20 automatic shotguns went in and out of an Omaha sporting goods store in less than 90 minutes.

In St. Louis a clothing store advertised men's white shirts in a Sunday newspaper. On Monday the department was jammed.

In Seattle, Christmas buying began with V-J Day and by Thanksgiving supplies of metal toys and men's clothing virtually had disappeared from the shelves. The Chamber of Commerce's retail branch termed the spending spree the "biggest Seattle will ever have."

## CAMPBELL AFTER ALUMINUM PLANTS WORTH MILLIONS

Medford Councilman Writes From Washington, D. C., of Deals Sought With RFC

Writing from Washington, D. C., Donald Campbell, 932 North Central avenue, stated that he has been inspecting steel and aluminum plants west of the Mississippi River and is now at the national capital with a view to acquiring them from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation. Campbell, a member of the Medford city council, is president of the proposed Campbell Steel and Aluminum Corporation.

Campbell wrote, "If we are successful in acquiring the said plants, now assuming the proportions of around \$400,000,000 investment, we will immediately place them in operation and spread a new industry through the country that will compare very favorably with the automobile industry today."

**Success Unknown**  
"Your guess is as good as mine as to whether we will be the successful bidder among several, but I am sure that we alone have the only program that will give the west an invaluable permanent industry of large proportions that will employ 100,000."

"At present I am very much concerned over the continuation of freight rates from the interior to the coast, and I have made the offer to the major lines of the west to allot them the same percentage of finished products over their lines that they hauled west in the form of finished products."

When Campbell stopped in Portland early in October en route east he told reporters there that he represented eastern bankers, interested in acquiring western aluminum plants, but refused to divulge the names of his backers.

## Court Martial Is Ordered For Head Of Famed Flagship

Washington, Nov. 28—(U.P.)—The navy announced today that a general court martial has been ordered convened for the trial of Capt. Charles B. McVay, III, commanding officer of the cruiser Indianapolis which was sunk last July 30.

The Indianapolis, flagship of the famed Fifth fleet, sailed from San Francisco on July 16, 1945, on a special high-speed run to Guam carrying atomic bomb material.

The ship delivered her historic cargo and was lost after departing from Guam.

There has never been any official cause given for the loss of the vessel.
