

DISTRICT LABOR COUNCIL SLATES LOCAL CONCLAVE

A meeting of the Klamath Basin district labor council and all affiliated local unions will be held at the Eagles hall in Medford Nov. 30 and Dec. 1, Thomas Grey, president of the Lumber and Sawmill Workers Local No. 2715, said today. Klamath district council includes the Klamath Basin area, north to Bend, east to Lakeview, south to McCloud, Calif. and west to Medford.

Grey said to the best of his knowledge no negotiations were underway at the present to settle the two-month-old AFL lumber mills strike but added definite action was expected on the part of one side or the other in a few days.

Northwest lumber workers struck two months ago on a demand for a minimum wage of \$1.10 per hour, with corresponding increases in all brackets, and a union shop.

A meeting held recently in Klamath Falls at which employers offered an increase of 12 1/2¢ an hour to all union employees was termed a failure.

Ex-German Flier, Seized In States Thinks U. S. Tops

Circleville, O. (U.P.)—Karl Wacker, a Luftwaffe pilot who entered America after V-E Day in an American uniform, hopes to live in this country some day with his wife and baby.

Wacker was lodged in the county jail here, on his way to the Federal correctional institution at Milan, Mich., but still thinks America is "tops."

The 20-year-old blond flier was born in Berlin, but lived in New York until his family was deported.

"Unlike the Germans who have never seen America, we know in comparison with Germany and Europe, it is Utopia," Wacker said.

"I like democracy, first because of the right to express myself freely along with the tolerant attitude of the people who live and let live; secondly because of the economic security."

Wacker said he wanted to come over here and fight in the South Pacific, but was caught.

"I'm hoping they will deport me instead of putting me in prison. I want to go back, and then do everything to come here with my family the right way."

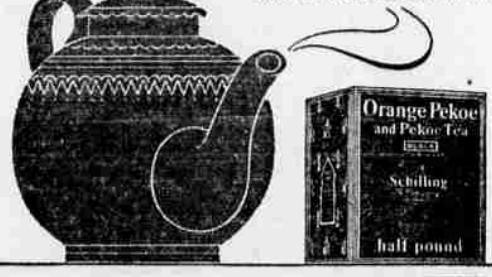

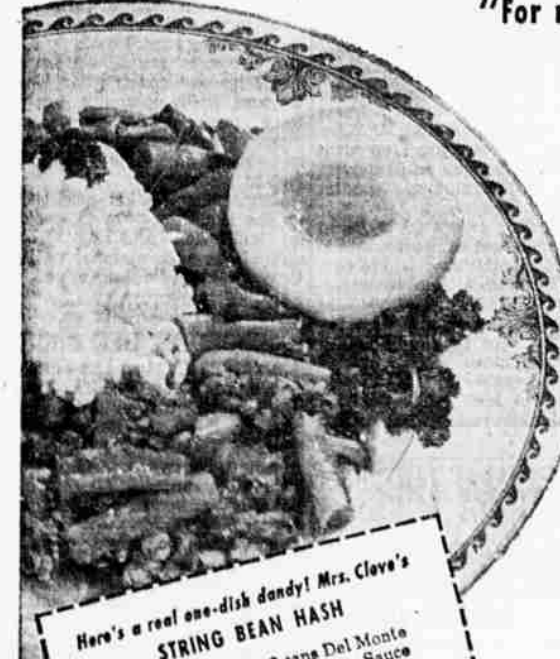
