

## Halsey Urges Middies To Beat Army In Saturday's Traditional Contest

Annapolis, Md., Nov. 28—(U.P.) It was Gen. Douglas MacArthur's orders against Admiral William Halsey's orders today concerning the Army-Navy football game, with Halsey's orders carrying more vehemence and MacArthur's appearance more likely to be carried out.

Halsey appeared at the naval academy yesterday to present Japanese war trophies to the Midshipmen's Brigade, and took occasion to tell the Navy football team to "fight like hell . . . and get that game with Army Saturday." West Point reported that MacArthur had telegraphed his best wishes, regretting he could not see the game, and closed with a succinct "Beat Navy."

Light contact work and signal practice was scheduled for today.

## CHICAGO BLESSED WITH RETURN OF BASEBALL STARS

Chicago, Nov. 28—(U.P.)—Harry Grabner, retiring general manager of the Chicago White Sox, handed his successor, Leslie O'Connor, a welcoming present today with the announcement that hard-hitting Ralph Hodgin has been discharged from the service.

At a luncheon in honor of O'Connor, who retired Dec. 15 as special assistant to baseball commissioner A. B. Chandler, Grabner announced that both Hodgin and Rookie Ralph Hamner, a pitcher, had been discharged and would rejoin the Sox at their Pasadena, Calif., spring training camp.

Hodgin, an outfielder-third baseman, was the American league's third best hitter in 1943 with a .314 average, while Hamner is an untested hurler purchased from Shreveport.

Meanwhile, the Sox's north-side neighbors, the Cubs, received their ninth and final catcher back from the service with the navy discharge of Ben Warren.

## Los Angeles Waits Mike Jacobs' Bid For Louis-Conn Go

Los Angeles, Nov. 28—(U.P.)—The Los Angeles coliseum board, "almost 100 per cent in favor" of having the Joe Louis-Billy Conn heavyweight title fight here, delayed final word today pending receipt of formal application from Mike Jacobs.

County Supervisor Leonard Roach said the board wanted Jacobs to list concrete terms.

"We're not pleading with Jacobs," he said. "Jacobs wants to come out here, too. It's a straight business proposition."

Roach said that the coliseum, on the basis of 10 per cent of the gate receipts, should get \$250,000 out of the fight by increasing the normal 103,000 seats to 140,000.

West Point, N. Y., Nov. 28—(U.P.)—After a one-day scare occasioned by Quarterback Arnold Tucker's high temperature, the Army football team returned to normal efficiency today after assurance that Tucker would play against Navy Saturday.

Dr. Robert Boyle said that the 102-degree reading was caused by a slight cold. Boyle said the temperature went down after treatment in the Academy hospital.

Dick Walterhouse moved up to first-string quarterback for a long scrimmage yesterday after the team first had gone through a stiff defensive drill.

## Farmers Backing Victory Loan As In Previous Days

Washington, Nov. 28—(U.P.)—American farmers are supporting the current \$11,000,000,000 victory loan with the same enthusiasm that marked previous bond drives, the treasury reported today.

National War Finance Director Ted R. Gamble said farmers are among the largest buyers of bonds. Their 1945 purchases of war and victory bonds are expected to total \$1,300,000,000, or 10 per cent of their estimated yearly income.

By the end of the year, farmers' over-all holdings in savings bonds will amount to about \$5,100,000,000.

Meanwhile, total sales to individuals in the victory loan rose to \$3,044,000,000, or more than 75 per cent of the \$4,000,000,000 goal for individuals.

"Wild disorders" in the camps are due to the "concentration camp nature of the civilian public service," the objectors said. They added they felt
