

MILL EMPLOYERS REITERATE OFFER TO AFL STRIKERS

Offers of the Employers' Negotiating committee of the Pine Industrial Relations committee, Inc., made to the Klamath Basin District Council of the Lumber

and Sawmill Workers, A. F. of L., now on strike, have been repeated in order that there may be no misunderstanding of the position of the employers according to copies of the terms received in Medford by A. A. Lausmann, Tiller Mill and Lumber company.

Five provisions are listed in the offer, the first providing a 12½ cents per hour increase across the board to all employees represented by the union, effective when employees resume work. The second requests that the union join with the employers in seeking government approval of the wage increase so that it could be considered an item of cost under Executive Order No. 9651, the wage increase to go into effect upon acceptance by local unions and their respective employers, and to remain in effect whether or not the application receives approval.

Third of the items listed under the offer provides for recognition that some or all employers might now, or in the future return to a 40-hour week and the fourth recognizes that individual employers and their local unions might wish to convert the increase into contract figures to piece workers. As a fifth point the employers ask the union to acknowledge the offer to be in full settlement of all past and present industry wage demands on the involved employers.

PARENTS HELD IN DEATH BY BEATING OF CHILD AGED 3

Golden, Colo., Nov. 29—(U.P.) Authorities in Golden today were holding for investigation the father and step-mother of a three-year-old child who was said to have died as the result of a "brutal and horrible" beating.

Sheriff George Koch of Jefferson county, said an autopsy had revealed that Robert Elliot died from extensive hemorrhages, brain laceration, extreme shock and multiple contusion of head, arms, legs and torso.

Child Is Witness
 Step-mother of the child, Mrs. Viola Elliot had admitted striking Robert Tuesday shortly before his death, authorities said.

A witness to the alleged brutal treatment to the child was 8-year-old Jimmie Laine, son of Mrs. Elliot by a former husband. Jimmie Laine told authorities that Mrs. Elliot knocked the baby from his carriage and then struck, kicked and kneed him. Sheriff Koch said the baby had tried to crawl across the room to a bed after the beating leaving a trail of blood spots.

The mother, wife of Leslie Elliot, worker in the U. S. mint in Denver who was also being held, went into the kitchen and drank a cup of coffee after the beating, according to the young boy's testimony.

She then called her husband who returned home at 9 a. m. and remained throughout the day until the mortuary was called, authorities said. Mrs. Elliot told Sheriff Koch that no doctor had been called to care for the child.

German Radios To Reunite Many Poles

Washington (U.P.)—Radios requisitioned from Germans are being used to reunite hundreds of displaced Polish families in Germany, the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration reported.

Poles in UNRRA's many assembly centers inside Germany listen daily to military government broadcasts which list the names of Poles at the different camps.

"The 45-minute broadcasts have put hundreds in touch with each other after years of separation."
