San Francisco, Nov. 29—(U.P.) The once-powerful Pacific coast conference failed to produce a single standout football team in 1945. So it took little St. Mary's College (enrollment 160) to dominate the annual United Press All-Star Western Football team.

The Galloping Gaels, who will play in the Sugar Bowl in New Orleans on New Year's Day, placed three men on the first team, one on the second. Another independent school, Nevada, nailed down a spot— and the other seven on the first club went to the conference teams.

DENVER OPPOSES CONFERENCE GRID SCHEDULE MAKING

Denver, Colo., Nov. 29—(U.P.)—Another fight was brewing today in the big seven conference and it was a good bet that Denver University will pull out of the circuit.

Football schedules are the cause of the row.

The matter will come to a showdown tomorrow at Salt Lake City when faculty representatives meet to draw up new schedules.

C. W. (Cac) Hubbard, head football coach and director of athletics at Denver said today that some of the other schools already had agreed on schedules and were planning to railroad through a program that will not be acceptable to Denver.

Home-and-Home Opposed
 Other conference schools long have favored scheduling football games on a home-and-home basis, meeting conference opponents twice in the same season. Denver, however, opposes such a plan.

The question is one of finances. Denver is the largest city in the Rocky Mountain region and as such draws the biggest crowds. For that reason all other conference members like to play in Denver, but for that same reason, the Pioneers like to schedule their best dates with inter-sectional teams that will pull the biggest crowds.

Left Conference Before
 If Denver leaves the conference, it won't be an unprecedented move.

The same controversy developed four years ago and Denver bolted. It operated for a year as an independent team after which a compromise was worked out. Denver played home-and-home games with only Colorado and Utah and appeared on the home fields of the other schools one year in three.

During the 1945 season, which ended when Denver won the big seven title by defeating Colorado on Thanksgiving day, Denver played seven games at home and only two away. The Pioneers had the heaviest schedule of non-conference games playing Colorado College, Kansas, Oklahoma A & M, and Drake. That is the kind of set-up Denver wants continued.

Annapolis, Md., Nov. 29—(U.P.) The Navy football team was scheduled to leave the Naval Academy today for the Pine Valley Country club near Philadelphia, its headquarters until the Army game Saturday.

The Middies ran through their plays yesterday on an extremely muddy practice field, and will go through a final signal drill on the playing field at Philadelphia Municipal stadium Friday afternoon.

Coach Oscar Hagberg, granting Army superiority only at fullback and the tackles, named a squad of 44 to make the trip. The Midshipmen's brigade of 3,000 gathered around a huge bonfire on Farragut field last night for a final pep rally.

Los Angeles, Nov. 29—(U.P.)—An All-Star football team will meet two Hawaiian teams in charity games at the "Clipper Bowl" on Dec. 9 and 16, it was announced here today.

The team, composed of ex-college greats, will leave here by air next Monday and board the Trans-Pacific Clipper at San Francisco.

The first island game was scheduled against the Lilehua Alumni team and the second against an all-star team of the Honolulu Alumni Football association.

San Francisco, Nov. 29—(U.P.) Assistant U. S. Attorney Albert S. Guerard was free on \$2,500 bail today after his arrest on charges of accepting a bribe from an Oakland, Calif., tavern owner.

Guerard was arrested late yesterday in his office by deputy U. S. marshals a few moments after an alleged \$3,500 bribe

changed hands before the eyes of an FBI agent.

U. S. Attorney Frank J. Hennessy said that Guerard, 63, was charged specifically with soliciting a bribe to neglect his duty. Hennessy said Guerard received the money in marked bills from

David B. Leon, the tavern owner.

Hennessy said Guerard had been in charge of prosecuting San Francisco bay area tavern operators found refilling whisky bottles and evading payment of federal taxes.

Conger and Morris, of Medford, have recently placed into operation, a new ambulance just out of the factory at Toledo, Ohio, and the last word in ambulance construction.

The first new ambulance to arrive on the Pacific coast for civilian use since Pearl Harbor, it has the greatest capacity in the rear compartment of any civilian ambulance yet manufactured, with ample room for three stretcher and two non-stretcher patients at one time.

It is equipped with new type heaters, and with a Stamm cot warmer designed by Mr. R. H. Rucker and which is to now become standard equipment by the factory. For warm weather, electric fans are used.

The general color of the vehicle is black and white, the color originally established by Conger-Morris in order that it might be readily recognized as an emergency car. As a further precaution for safety, it carries a large combination siren and red blinker light in front and two red blinkers on top of rear. Also two red side lights.

Priority application was made to the Office of Price Administration at Washington, D. C., early this year, and Mr. Conger and Mr. Morris are now pleased to introduce this new and excellent service to the public.
