ACCUSED MOTHER HYSTERICAL OVER FLOCK ON STAND

San Francisco, Dec. 1—(U.P.)—Mrs. Annie Irene Mansfeldt, whose trial for murdering her suspected love rival is in weekend recess, broke into a violent screaming and weeping fit today after protesting to her attorney the calling of her three children to the stand Monday.

The Auburn-haired society matron, whose doctor-husband committed suicide shortly after she confessedly shot and killed nurse Vada Martin Oct. 4, collapsed and had to be carried from the visitor's room of the county jail to her bed.

The emotional outburst came during a discussion with Chief Defense Counsel Vincent Hallinan of plans for Monday's court appearance.

Mrs. Mansfeldt said yesterday, according to Hallinan, that she was agreeable toward having her children appear in her defense. Hallinan said she protested today against calling them and then began screaming and sobbing when he argued that their testimony might mean the difference between her own freedom or a prison sentence.

She is scheduled to take the stand Monday along with the children, Terry, 12, John, 14, and Irene, 15.
