

COPCO REMITS \$123,081 TAXES

The California Oregon Power company has remitted \$123,081.10 for 1945-1946 taxes in full, according to the tax collection department of the sheriff's office. The utility corporation is the heaviest taxpayer in Jackson county.

The Southern Pacific Railroad company was second with a contribution of \$75,103.78. Other substantial payers were the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company, \$25,089.92, the Medford Corporation, \$24,239.96, and the Timber Products Co., \$11,201.21.

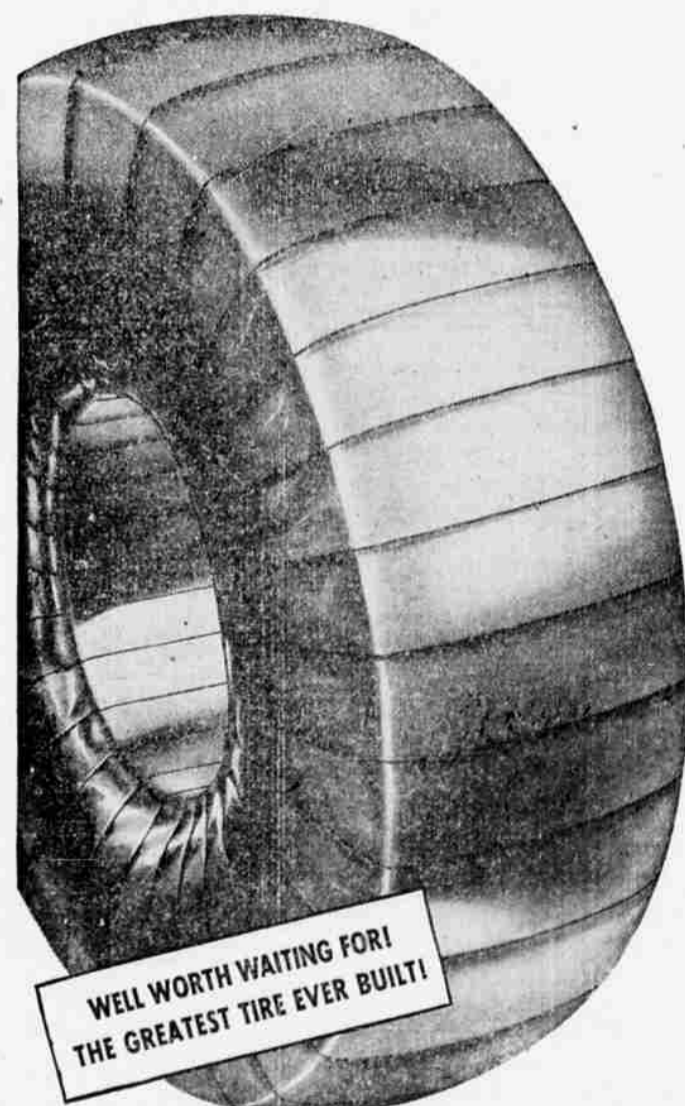
