

TEST LITTLE GIRL TO SEE IF HEART ILL CAN BE CURED

Baltimore, Md., Dec. 4.—(U.P.)—Two-year-old Judy Hackman, of Buckley, Wash., underwent the first of a series of tests today to determine if an operation can save her life.

The little curly-haired blond girl started the tests cheerfully, unaware that she may die within a year if physicians decide the operation would be useless.

Judy has been unable to move more than 10 feet since birth because her heart is unable to pump enough blood to her lungs. Physicians give her a year to live unless an operation can be performed.

She was flown to Johns Hopkins hospital in a last ditch hope that one of her arteries can be spliced to another artery leading to her lung, stepping up the flow of blood.

Only 64 such operations have been performed previously. Her mother, Mrs. Henry Heckman,

based her hope on the fact that another Washington child, Dickie Walker of Seattle, was saved by a similar operation.

It was Dickie's case that inspired Mrs. Hackman to bring Judy to Johns Hopkins. Her family physician happened to discuss the case with Dickie's family doctor. He told how Dickie had been saved. Mrs. Hackman immediately decided to bring Judy to Baltimore.

The tests will take two or three days.

301 GIVEN X-RAYS HERE YESTERDAY

Yesterday 301 persons were given chest x-rays by the staff of the Oregon Tuberculosis association mobile x-ray unit which is operating in Medford, according to the Jackson County Public Health association. Three hundred persons is considered a maximum day for the unit technicians, it was stated, and since the workers have handled far in excess of that number for the first few days of the program, the number was held down in order that the staff might have a less strenuous program.

The work here will be concluded today, and the mobile unit will go to Ashland for the final two days for this county. Persons x-rayed today are being taken care of by appointment.

Since the number who availed themselves of the x-ray program has far exceeded expectations, an effort will be made to have the unit return as soon as possible, it was said.

EMBASSY CLERK WOULD TESTIFY

Hoboken, N. J., Dec. 4.—(U.P.)—Tyler Kent, former clerk in the U. S. embassy in London who spent five years in a British prison for violation of the British official secrets act, returned to this country today and said he had taken "certain documents" into his London room because they contained information he thought the people of the United States should know.

"These documents contained information the senate of the United States should have known and was kept in ignorance of," Kent said.

"I wanted to inform the senators of them on my own initiative."

He said the information they contained related to the foreign relations of the United States at that time (1940).

Frank Hamilton Is District Forester For Medford Area

Frank Hamilton, graduate of Oregon State college, has been named district forester for the Medford area. Dwight L. Phipps, assistant state forester, announced today. Hamilton has had five years experience with the U. S. Forest service and four years as state department technician assistant for northwest Oregon.

He replaces A. D. McReynolds who resigned last July to accept a position with the West Coast Lumbermen's association at Eugene.

Hamilton, with his wife and three children, have taken up residence at state forestry headquarters on Midway Road.

NAVY TO CEASE HAULING CHINESE

Chinsien, Manchuria, Dec. 4.—(U.P.)—Admiral Daniel E. Barbey, commander of the U. S. 7th fleet, was understood today to have informed Gen. Tu Li-Ming that the U. S. Navy would not transport any new contingents of Chinese nationalist troops to the civil war zone.

Barbey, first high-ranking American officer to go into the interior of Manchuria in 14 years, spent two days visiting the commander of the Chinese nationalist forces in Manchuria.

With Tu, he watched Chinese pilots land the first American-made planes at Chinsien since the nationalists took over the city a week ago. Eleven C-46's brought supplies, reinforcements and munitions for Tu's troops fighting against communist forces on the Mukden front.

It was implied that with inauguration of the Chinese air supply line, the U. S. Navy would withdraw from transporting nationalist units from rear bases to North China and Manchuria.

New York, Dec. 4.—(U.P.)—A late burst of buying lifted rail-road shares to a 14-year high shortly before the close today and gave the stock market an irregular appearance in the final hour.

Demand for the carrier shares largely reflected announcement of New York Central's plan to purchase new equipment in excess of \$22,000,000 and disclosure by the Baldwin Locomotive

works that it has booked orders for 75 Diesel locomotives.

As the rails started upward, buying spread into retail store shares and in this group Abraham & Straus rose 14 points on an odd-lot sale. The retail store group responded to announcement that October retail sales of nearly \$7,000,000,000 were up 12 per cent over 1944 and comprised the second largest monthly total on record.

Polite Language Not Expected in UNO Petitions

London, Dec. 4.—(U.P.)—Soviet Ambassador Andrei A. Gromyko told his United Nations preparatory commission colleagues today that they should not expect petitions from dependent peoples to be couched in polite language.

Gromyko sought a greater voice for native peoples under the United Nations trusteeship system. The trusteeship committee was considering the rules governing petitions about trusteeships including one which would allow the rejection of petitions "trivial in nature or couched in abusive language."

Dimitri Manuileski, Ukraine delegate, suggested that the language be eliminated lest it be employed to avoid consideration of petitions.

Confusion of OPA Blamed in Suicide Of "Santa Claus"

Los Angeles, Dec. 4.—(U.P.)—Brooding over "OPA confusion" was blamed today for the suicide of Frederick G. Rose, 68, known as the neighborhood's Santa Claus.

Rose, a real estate dealer, spent his leisure time making toys for neighborhood children.

His widow, Mrs. Bertha Rose, told officers he brooded over "OPA confusion" and had been to an OPA office to inquire about evicting a tenant from a Pasadena house a few minutes before he fatally shot himself yesterday.

Socialists Win Key Italian Portfolio

Rome, Dec. 4.—(U.P.)—Wearied by 18 hours of continuous conferences, Alcide De Gasperi went to the Royal House at 3 p. m. today to accept a formal charge to head the new Italian government in which the socialists won the key interior portfolio.

The 11-day government crisis was resolved at 3 a. m., after a "now or never" conference that started at 9 a. m. yesterday, when the liberal party reversed its previous stubborn stand and agreed that the ministry of interior should be held by a socialist.

BUTTE FALLS MAN PLANS TO EXHIBIT TROPHIES OF WAR

Capt. Malcolm Clark, Butte Falls, who served in Europe for nearly two years, is making plans to exhibit in Medford several rifles and pistols and a collection of knives and sabers which he brought home as war trophies. Capt. Clark was overseas from October, 1943, to November, 1945.

Prize of the collection is a rifle which came from the collection of Herman Goering. The rifle was that used by the winner of the 1937 annual forester's match in Berlin. Capt. Clark states, it having been the custom for the winner to present his gun to Goering, Germany's chief forester before the war, for the Goering collection. The rifle was hand-made by Karl Willhammer of Tegernsee, according to inscriptions on the gun.

Capt. Clark, who also has a flag collection, is currently working for the Medford corporation but will return to Oregon State college for the next term of school where he will be a senior in the department of forestry.
