Chicago, Dec. 4—(U.P.)—A giant, coal-black Aberdeen Angus, winner in the junior championship steer division, will compete today for the grand championship of the Chicago fat stock show.

The prize-winning 1,070-pound steer, Queen's Lad, owned by Robert Johnson, 20-year-old Galva, Ia., youth, was chosen grand champion of the junior cattle entrants over champions in the Hereford and Shorthorn classes.

Johnson's entry defeated a champion Hereford exhibited by T. Richard Lacy, Jr., 19, Kansas, Ill., and a Shorthorn steer entered by Albert Fritzer, 19, Sterling, Colo.

Fritzer's steer, Shorty, was awarded the reserve championship. Lacy's placed third.
