

MILLS AT CENTRAL POINT AND KERBY SIGN WITH UNION

Two southern Oregon mills, the Kaybak Milling company of Kerby and the Southern Oregon Planing Mills of Central Point, have come to an agreement with the sawmill workers' union, on strike for the past 10 weeks, and have been placed on the "fair list" according to Thomas M. Gray, president of Local No. 2715, Lumber and Sawmill Workers, A. F. of L. Gray stated that the two mills had "met the full demands of the union," including an agreement to pay a minimum wage of \$1.05 per hour and to grant the union shop, adding that the settlement made was similar to that arrived at between workers and management in the fir belt.

Gray said he believed that both mills would resume operations Monday.

Boggis, 52, who passed away suddenly last Thursday in Grants Pass where he was taken for medical aid after having been stricken with an apparent heart attack while working on Birdseye creek, will be held in the Conger-Morris chapel at 2:30 p. m. Tuesday with the Rev. W. A. Dawes officiating. Interment will be in Jacksonville cemetery.

Mr. Boggis was born in Gold Hill, Sept. 25, 1893, and spent his entire lifetime in this county. For the last 10 years he has been employed by Jackson county in road construction and maintenance work.

Besides his wife, Ida Mae Boggis, whom he married in Jacksonville in 1925, he leaves one sister, Mrs. Chas. E. Rose of Medford and a brother, John Boggis of Bandon, Ore.

KEY WITNESS IN MANSFELDT CASE IN SUICIDE TRY

Defense Counsel Blames
Prosecution for Dramatic
Twist

San Francisco, Dec. 8—(U.P.)—Defense Attorney James MacInnis charged tonight that "misconduct" by Prosecutor Norman Elkington was responsible for the suicide attempt last night of a key witness for Mrs. Annie Irene Mansfeldt, whose murder trial is in its second weekend recess.

MacInnis said that Mrs. Marie Moore, scheduled to testify in the prosecution rebuttal Monday, took poison because Elkington had "attempted to discredit her" by "revealing details of her early life."

Mrs. Moore, found unconscious in her home, was recovering today in a psychopathic ward of San Francisco hospital. She was not expected to be able to testify Monday.

MacInnis, conducting Mrs. Mansfeldt's defense with Vincent Hallinan, close friend of the red-haired socialite charged with the jealousy murder of Nurse Vada Martin, said the defense would seek Monday to have Elkington held in contempt of court as a result of the suicide attempt.

Mrs. Moore's dramatic attempt to take her own life accentuated the tragedy of the Mansfeldt case which already has claimed two lives and led to one suicide try by the defendant.

Dr. John Mansfeldt committed suicide a few hours after his wife shot and killed the nurse she believed had stolen her husband's love. Mrs. Mansfeldt testified she had attempted to hang herself in her cell while awaiting trial.

The trial thus far has been one of the most dramatic in San Francisco legal history. The defendant's own emotional outbursts, the tragedy of a broken home—exemplified by the three Mansfeldt children testifying in their mother's defense—and the presence of Navy Warrant Officer Wilbur P. Martin who has bitterly demanded that Mrs. Mansfeldt "pay the full penalty" for slaying his wife, have combined to charge courtroom atmosphere with tension at every session.

The prosecution had announced its intention to call Mrs.

Moore as a rebuttal witness Monday because of a belief that "she had perjured herself" when she testified earlier that she had seen Dr. Mansfeldt and Mrs. Martin kissing and embracing.

MacInnis tonight declared that Elkington's action in telling reporters that Mrs. Moore had a police record "savoured of misconduct." The fact she had been convicted of a misdemeanor, he said, was not admissible as evidence.

DUNCAN SISTERS LAND DEAL TOLD

The Jackson county court recently received an inquiry from Rosetta and Viola Duncan, members of a famous stage sister team, relative to property Rosetta once owned in Jackson county. County Judge J. B. Coleman went through the records, and found that on September 9, 1918, E. A. Higginson of Los Angeles deeded to Rosetta Duncan, two parcels of land in the Griffin Creek district, for \$10 cash and "subject to known encumbrances." The land is now owned by E. F. Adams and T. A. Gieber, the records show.

The Duncan Sisters resided in the Griffin Creek district, and attended public school there for three or four years, 30 or more years ago.
