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UNJUSTIFIABLE MAJOR OPERATION

Surgical removal of tonsils with guillotine and snare or desiccation or so-called "enucleation" is a serious, major operation involving such grave risks to the child's life that in my opinion it is rarely justifiable.

If there is reason to believe or fear the tonsil is the seat of malignancy (cancer development), then this radical operation is indeed imperative immediately.

If the child's breathing is obstructed enough to retard or impair development and growth of to make the child constantly restless in the struggle for breath nights, then an operation should be done, but not tonsillectomy, if you ask me. I'd have no such atrocity inflicted on my child in such circumstance.

Instead I'd have the tonsils "clipped" — a considerable portion sliced off with the gadget called the tonsillotome — as soon as the child is under either the ring of the gadget is placed around the tonsil and pht! — a portion is sliced off; then in jig time a portion is sliced off the opposite side. That's all. And that is enough. I say it is atrocious to subject the child to any greater risk just because the doctor is confused in his mind as to the purpose of treatment. Believe it or not, the conception on which some physicians and throat specialists base the practice of "getting every bit of tonsil" is that tonsil tissue in itself is harmful or dangerous to have in the throat. If this isn't an absurd medical fallacy I'll eat my words, and I'll do it right here in public.

SOME IN G. PASS OPPOSE ADOPTING PARKING METERS

Grants Pass, Dec. 10.—Grants Pass may get parking meters, but Grants Pass will not like them according to new commentaries by business men, merchants, officials, and men along the streets.

The city emerged as a "small town" in local eyes as the new statements were given, but several refused to be quoted as their opinions, they said, were "too hot" to be published.

That the merchants have only themselves to blame was an opinion expressed in different quarters, and by merchants themselves. This grew from what was termed abuse of present parking facilities as the merchants kept their own cars parked along business streets.

A greater need for safety devices was pointed out. Rev. E. J. Aschenbrenner, pastor of the Newman Methodist church, said: "The first concern of our city government with regard to traffic should be the item of safety, not another device for collecting revenue. Parking meters will contribute nothing toward the greater safety of our people. Signal lights and better protection at railroad crossings should come first."

"Let the people park wherever there is room. When Sixth street is full, they will park on a side street. Parking meters will result in increasing the speed and decreasing the safety of Sixth street traffic."
