

## WIFELESS VET, BABY ARE GIVEN HELP BY POLICE

New Orleans (U.P.)—Everyone knows that "the law" has several obligations other than just being a policeman. For the police often are called upon to lend a helping hand.

An ex-service man stepped out of a New Orleans train station recently and Police Sergeant Robert L. Brown saw immediately that the sandy-haired young man needed a helping hand, and bled.

He carried a heavy hand-trunk in one hand and a tiny baby in the other.

The young father smiled wryly and said, "You just don't know."

He wouldn't give his name, but admitted he was traveling across country from New York to Seattle.

### Wife Gone

He explained it this way: "My wife's gone. The baby is all I have and I intend taking care of him and raising him myself. I can't just use my name. I can't take any chances of having my son taken from me."

Within a few minutes after being taken into custody by the police sergeant, the trio were at a swanky New Orleans hotel where reservations are all but impossible to make.

Soon a room, hot bottles of formula and a baby bed were provided and the three-month-old infant and his exhausted father were getting a much needed lay-over rest.

The ex-soldier said later that he had received a medical discharge after spending 14 months in a hospital, where he had recovered from wounds in the European theater.

## BOND SALES MAY DOUBLE GOAL SET

Washington, Dec. 12—(U.P.)—Total sales in the \$11,000,000,000 Victory Bond drive may reach \$20,000,000,000 by the time the final count is in, War Finance Director Ted R. Gamble estimated today.

Total sales have already reached \$17,207,000,000, with sales to corporations and individuals as a whole well over their quotas. Sales of E bonds are the only ones still short of their goal.

E bond sales totaled \$1,291,000,000 last night, more than the expected amount for that date.

Although the formal drive was completed last Saturday, the sales for the remainder of the

month will be tallied in favor of the respective goals.

## FOREST CONGRESS FOR CONSERVATION OF NATION'S LAND

Washington (U.P.)—The American Forestry Assn. has announced the formation of an American Forestry Congress to formulate a postwar conservation program for the nation's 630,000,000 acres of forest land.

The congress will be held here upon completion of a nationwide survey now being made by the association to determine the effects of war drains on the forest resources of the United States.

This survey, expected to be completed early in 1946, will reveal the amount of timber in each state, its location, character and composition.

W. S. Rosecrans, Los Angeles, president of the association, in announcing the congress, pointed out that with the survey it will be possible to analyze the nation's forestry situation, state by state and on an overall national basis.

At that time, he said, "it is important that all forest interests unite in developing postwar programs that will speed progress in meeting future needs for wood."

## PHOENIX PLANT WILL INCREASE CAPACITY

Phoenix, Dec. 12—A new addition that will double the capacity of the plant will be made to the Associated Fruit Company packing house at Phoenix, according to J. P. Naumes, manager of the firm.

Construction is scheduled to begin shortly after January 1. Mr. Naumes estimated that the number of employees at the plant during harvest season would be increased from 20 to 50 or 60.

## College Airstrip Saves State Money

San Luis Obispo, Cal.—(U.P.)—Army engineers of the Timberwolf (140th) division here are saving the state of California about \$40,000 by using California Polytechnic college's airstrip site as a practical project for giving their men experience in handling heavy equipment.

The engineers are completing the entire airstrip except for surfacing in exchange for "schooling" under instructors in the college in engineering, surveying, contour mapping, soil compaction and construction.

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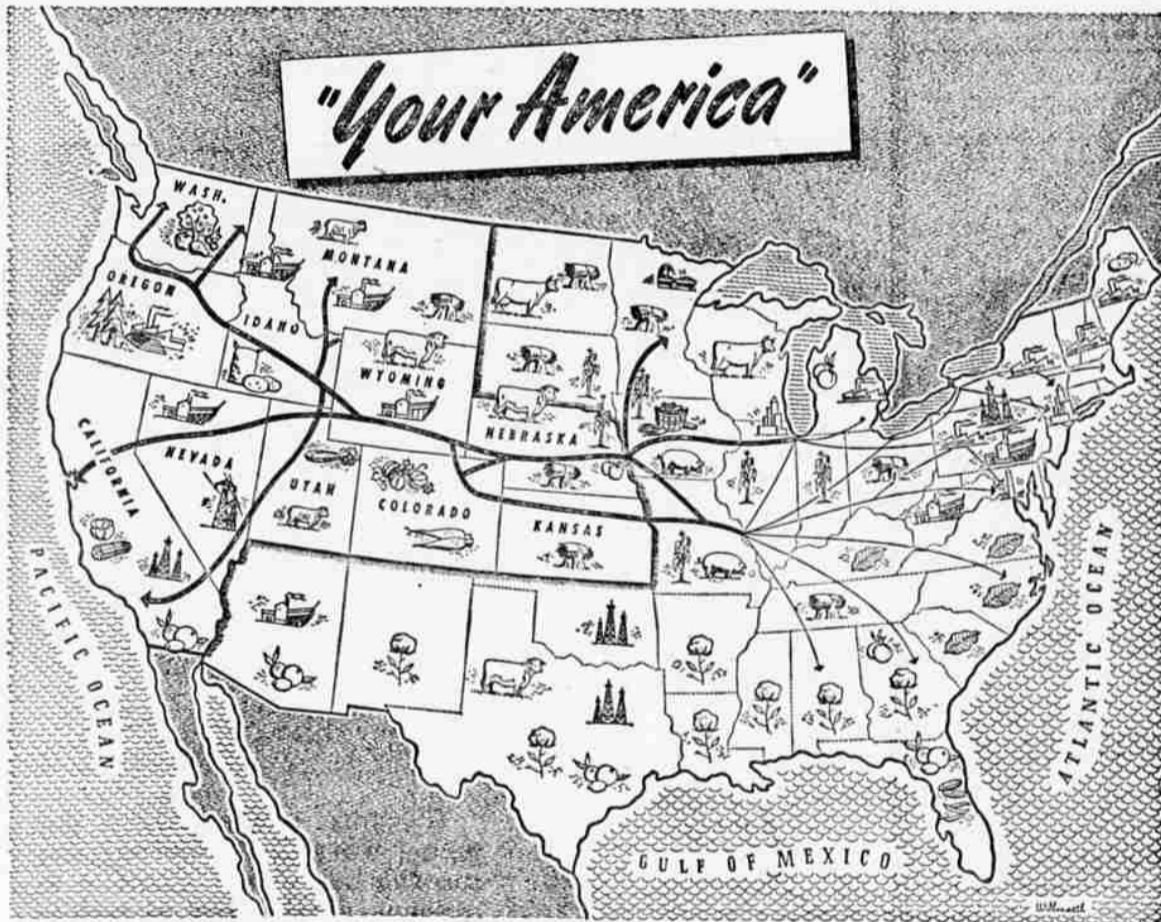
